Harvest Moon Music Festival announces 2026 lineup for fifth annual event

SOUTH SHORE - The Town of Bridgewater revealed the lineup Aug. 20 for the fifth annual Harvest Moon Music Festival, which will take place Sept. 18 and 19 at Pijinuiskaq Park.

This year's festival will also celebrate the 10th anniversary of the park, created as part of the Town's \$5-million Take Back the Riverbank infrastructure pro-

ject. The park officially opened in June 2017 and has since served as a regular venue for community gatherings.

The festival will begin Friday with performances by Talel McBriar, Emma Worley, and Claire Hunter, three solo artists who are joining together for an East Coast tour. South Shore country and bluegrass band, Diggin' Up Grubs, will follow.

Lunenburg District RCMP investigating fatal collision

LILYDALE - Lunenburg District RCMP is investigating a fatal collision that occurred in Lilydale, near Lunenburg.

On Aug. 19 at approximately 4:20 p.m., Lunenburg District RCMP, fire services, and EHS responded to a report of a collision on Northwest Rd. near Schnares Crossing Rd. Officers learned that a Chevrolet Spark had collided with a Hyundai Accent then a Dodge Ram.

A passenger in the Chevrolet, a 53-year-old man from Blockhouse, was transported to hospital and pronounced deceased. The driver was airlifted to hospital with serious injuries and a second passenger was transported to hospital by EHS.

The driver and passenger in the Dodge Ram reported minor injuries. The driver and only occupant of the Hyundai Accent did not report any physical injuries.

Northwest Rd. was closed for several hours between Hwy. 332 and Fauxburg Rd. while an RCMP collision reconstructionist attended the location of the collision.

Officers appreciate the actions of bystanders who offered assistance at the scene.

The investigation is ongoing.

Youth startup challenge gives South Shore youth hands-on experience

SOUTH SHORE – Ten young entrepreneurs in Bridgewater received a crash course in starting a business last week through the \$100 Youth Startup Challenge, a program meant to give participants hands-on experience taking an idea from concept to market.

Among the camp leaders is Joshua Mullen, a summer youth intern with United Atlantic, an incubation organization that operates across Atlantic Canada. Mullen, currently studying engineering at Dalhousie University. Mullen spent his summer running youth teams throughout Nova Scotia, including an earlier camp in Lunenburg and a final session in Chester.

The purpose of the challenge was to introduce young people to entrepreneurship by giving them \$100 and encouraging them to come up with, make, and sell their own products as they tried to make a profit.

“The goal of this \$100 Youth Startup Challenge is to teach kids about entrepreneurship and give them real experience by getting them to make their own products and actually take it to market and try to make a profit,” Mullen said.

Instead of just learning about entrepreneurship in a classroom, the campers spent the week going through the same basic steps entrepreneurs face when turning an idea into a business, from spotting a problem and making a product to marketing it and making a sale.

During the week, participants moved through different stages of building a business. Each day focused on a separate part of entrepreneurship, starting with coming up with ideas and moving through planning, finance, marketing, sales, and preparing for the market.

Guest speakers who had experience as entrepreneurs also visited the camp to share advice and give participants a look at what running a business is really like.

By the last day, participants were finishing their products and getting ready to test their ideas with actual customers.

The businesses that the campers created ranged from practical products to handmade crafts.

One participant came up with a sticky solution meant to improve the grip of soccer goalie gloves. The idea came from noticing teammates whose gloves would lose their grip over time, which could affect how well they played.

Other participants made crochet keychains, scrunchies, wooden bowls, and other wooden crafts, including decorative flowers. Another camper sold car parts as decorative items, while others made products using felt and fur.

The week ended with the participants bringing their businesses directly to market at the Bridgewater Farmers Market on Empire Street on Saturday, Aug. 15.

Mullen said the organizers worked with the farmers market and the Town of Bridgewater to give the young entrepreneurs a designated space where they could sell their products.

The marketplace ran from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. Saturday, Aug. 15, giving participants a chance to interact with customers, pitch their products, and see how their ideas worked in a real-world setting.

For Mullen, that hands-on experience was at the core of the program.

Well loan program in Queens County delayed as councillors seek more information

REGION OF QUEENS - Queens County residents will have to wait a little longer for a low-interest loan program for new drilled wells.

Regional councillors asked staff at their Aug. 11 meeting for more information and some changes to a proposed bylaw.

The loan program idea was introduced on May 12, as part of a proposed three-part approach to battling water shortages in the region. At the time, councillors set aside \$100,000 for it.

Senior staff have been working out the details with council’s input. In the proposed bylaw discussed on Aug. 11, the region would offer maximum \$30,000 loans to residents who meet the criteria at a two per cent interest rate over 10 years.

Staff also suggested that if councillors wanted a maximum household income cutoff, they could set it at \$140,000.

They looked at other municipalities that already offer a well loan program. The Municipality of the District of Lunenburg offers up to \$20,000 at a

two per cent rate to be repaid over five years. The Municipality of the District of Chester offers as much as \$30,000 at three per cent over a 10-year period. The Halifax region offers loans at prime plus two per cent up to \$20,000 over a 10-year term.

Municipalities in Halifax, Yarmouth and East Hants borrow money to run their programs.

The Clean Foundation used to administer MODL’s loan program, policy analyst Alex Wilson told councillors. He said the average loan request there was between \$20,000 and \$30,000, and that municipality is now budgeting about \$500,000 a year for it.

“If it came over that \$20,000 loan cost, the resident would be expected to pay out of pocket or through another form of lending. They would have to pay for that additional cost.”

Councillors wanted the maximum loan amount reduced to \$25,000, an income cap lower than \$140,000, and information on reducing the term to five years. They asked staff to investigate whether it would make sense for the municipality to borrow the funds for the program. And they wanted more information on how to expand it to benefit more people since they set aside only \$100,000 for it.

District 4 Coun. Vicki Amirault wanted to know whether people living in RVs on private land would be eligible.

Deputy Mayor Maddie Charlton said given the success of the municipality’s subsidized rain barrel and water tote program, which sold out in a day, she wants to make sure as many residents as possible have access to the loans.

“I think in four phone calls it would be done and then we would be back here wondering how we were going to expand upon it,” she said. “So, if we could get any further information about that before we initiate it, because we definitely had some lessons learned from the totes and barrels ... How can we make it the best for residents because it will be chewed up very quickly.”

The earliest the bylaw could take effect is later in the fall. That depends on whether councillors approve first reading at their next meeting on Sept. 8, though it was unclear when staff would be able to have a revised bylaw for councillors to review.

August 26, 1914

A large number from here, including the 69th regiment band, attended the garden party at Chester Basin Thursday evening. The crowd went forward by auto, motor boat, carriage and bicycle.

Friday’s main act will be HIRTLE, a country-rock group led by vocalist Connor Hirtle from Dublin Shore. The band recently played at the Cavendish Beach Music Festival and currently has its song, Wildfire, competing on the Canadian Indie Country Countdown.

Saturday’s events will begin in the afternoon with a new youth-oriented section. The Buchanans of Music Youth Stage will feature performances by young local musicians and a Youth Market will allow young business owners from the area to present their ventures.

On Saturday evening, the program will start with a 5:30 p.m. recognition of Pijiniuskaq Park’s 10th anniversary. At 6 p.m., the Michelin Bridgewater Main Stage will feature DeeDee Austin, a 20-year-old Indigenous singer-songwriter who earned a Golden Buzzer on Canada’s Got Talent.

Austin, who is a member of the Abegweit First Nation on Prince Edward

Island, has received national attention through the JUNO Awards, East Coast Music Awards, and other recognitions.

Nova Scotia alt-pop duo Neon Dreams will headline Saturday night at 7 p.m., joined by special guest Booshle G., who is touring with them from South Africa.

The festival will end with the annual Harvest Moon fireworks at dusk, organized by the Bridgewater Fire Department.

The Town is presenting the festival with help from several partners, including presenting partner Arby’s Restaurant in Bridgewater, South Shore Centre, and Michelin Bridgewater, which is supporting Saturday’s main stage.

The festival also continues the town’s tradition of using Pijiniuskaq Park as a key community gathering spot. The park’s name is derived from the traditional Mi’kmaw name for the LaHave River, highlighting the town’s place within Mi’kma’ki, the ancestral and unceded homeland of the Mi’kmaq people.



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Our communities deserve clean energy, not new fossil fuels

We all deserve clean air to breathe, safe water to drink, and a healthy community in which to raise our kids. As a retired doctor, I spent many decades protecting people’s health, and part of that job was telling people the truth, even when it was hard to hear. That’s why I believe our province needs an honest conversation about what new gas plants and fracking would mean for the air, water and communities that our health depends on.

Our health and the health of our environment go hand in hand. When you pollute the air, soil, or water, the harms don’t stay “out there” in nature. They end up in our clinics, emergency rooms, and homes.

Right now, Nova Scotia is spending millions of dollars to attract companies to explore for gas beneath our feet and off our shores. The push is also on to build two new gas and diesel power plants in Pictou County.

We’re being sold a clean, safe story. A report by the Center for Climate Integrity shows how oil and gas companies spent decades running “clean natural gas” ad campaigns built to cast doubt on solid health and climate science. But no ad campaign can hide what this industry’s products do in the real world.

Take fracking, the way gas is pulled from the ground. It blasts millions of litres of fresh water, sand, and toxic chemicals deep underground to crack open rock. It uses huge amounts of water from local lakes and rivers, then turns it into toxic wastewater full of heavy metals, chemicals, and even radioactive material where uranium is present.

Companies are allowed to hide the exact chemical recipe as a “trade secret.” We’re being asked to trust an industry that won’t even tell us what it’s putting in the ground. The EXPERIVA study in British Columbia found these substances showing up in people’s tap water and indoor air.

Physicians who treat patients near fracking sites see the health harms firsthand. In the short term, exposure



to fracking pollution can trigger asthma attacks and send more people to hospital with breathing problems.

Over time, studies link it to higher rates of heart disease, childhood leukemia and rare cancers. Studies also link living near fracked wells to more premature births and low birth weights — a leading cause of infant death in Canada.

Burning gas for electricity brings more toxic air pollution, including fine soot and nitrogen oxides that trigger asthma, strain the heart, and raise cancer risk. The Pictou County plants would also burn diesel as backup in winter. According to Health Canada and the World Health Organization, diesel exhaust causes cancer. It’s also known to cause serious breathing problems and may lead to heart problems. More pollution puts more strain on our health system and raises costs for everyone.

These harms won’t be shared evenly. Rural and First Nations communities living closest to the plants and drilling sites will carry the most risk. Children, seniors, pregnant people, and those already living with illness will be hit hardest. They didn’t create this problem, but their bodies will pay for it.

We’re often told gas is the “only way” to keep the lights on or grow the economy. As a doctor, I can’t accept that making our neighbours and children

sick is the only way to build a strong future for Nova Scotia. Affordable battery storage, energy efficiency, and modern grid tools are already delivering reliable, affordable power right here in Atlantic Canada. We can choose to build on that without trading away our health.

Our communities deserve the full facts about the health risks of fossil fuels before any project is approved. And First Nations must be consulted as full Treaty partners, with free, prior, and informed consent.

So, let’s take a breath and have an honest conversation — with our families, our neighbours, and our local leaders — about the risks we’re willing to take, and to place on others, if we allow new fossil fuel exploration and build new gas plants. Deciding what kind of province we want to live in, and what we’ll leave for our children and grandchildren, is too important to leave up to an industry known for covering up truth.

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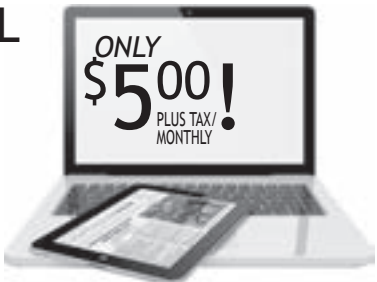

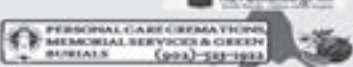

Stuffed Baked
Potato Bomb

Perfect for summer grilling.

INGREDIENTS

- 4 large baking potatoes (Russet potatoes work best)
- 1 tbsp olive oil
- Salt and pepper
- 2 cups cooked pulled pork or shredded chicken
- ½ cup BBQ sauce
- 1 cup grated mature cheddar
- 4 slices streaky bacon, cooked and crumbled
- 2 spring onions, finely sliced
- Sour cream for serving

PREPARATION

1. Rub potatoes with olive oil and a generous amount of salt.
2. Wrap loosely in foil.
3. Place on indirect heat (not directly over the flames).
4. Cook for 50-70 minutes, turning occasionally, until soft when squeezed.
5. Mix the pulled pork/chicken with BBQ sauce.
6. Unwrap potatoes and cut a lengthwise slit.
7. Scoop out some of the fluffy potato into a bowl.
8. Mix the scooped potato with half the cheese, bacon, and spring onions.
9. Fill each potato with the potato mixture.
10. Top with BBQ pork and remaining cheese.
11. Return to the BBQ (without foil) for 10-15 minutes with the lid closed until the cheese is melted and bubbling. Pro tip: For a crispy bottom place the stuffed potatoes in a cast-iron skillet on the BBQ during the final cook

Serve with sour cream, extra spring onions, bacon, sweet corn kernels, diced red peppers, jalapeños, and other toppings of your choice.

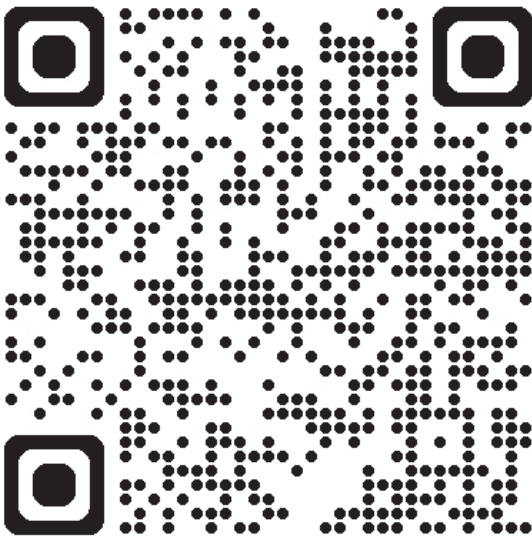

WellTide Health aims to improve health care access in Lunenburg County

COOKVILLE - A new 45,000-square-foot health and community facility in Cookville is set to begin a soft opening by the end of the year, with its operators aiming to address some of the biggest health care access issues facing residents in Lunenburg and Queens counties.

WellTide Health was created through a partnership between Partners for Care (PFC), Lindsay Construction and RCS Construction, after discussions with the Municipality of the District of Lunenburg (MODL) about its plans for a new community centre.

MODL became an anchor tenant in the building, which will bring together community services, health and wellness providers and other supports all under one roof.

PFC CEO Nick Jennery said the organization carried out a gap analysis for a catchment area of about 63,000 people to figure out which health care needs should come first. Primary health care, women’s health, pediatric care, system navigation, orthopedic and arthritis services and mental health and addictions were identified as some of the most pressing needs.

“What inspired this and what the gap is, in a word, it’s access to the health care that people

need,” Jennery said.

PFC is now working to bring health care providers into the facility through low- and no-cost arrangements where possible. Jennery noted that affordability is especially important given the level of poverty in the region, though the facility will also include fee-for-service providers where services are not covered by Nova Scotia Health.

The building will also feature community-focused amenities operated by MODL, such as a library partnership, Fancy Pants Cafe, a commercial kitchen, an events hall, and various community support and education services.

A key part of the project will be the 5,000-square-foot Partners for Care Collaboration Hub.

The hub will include an on-site system navigator who can help residents figure out where to go within the health care system and connect them with the right services.

Jennery said the aim is to provide a “warm transfer” instead of just handing people a phone number and leaving them to figure out the system by themselves.

The hub will also have shared clinical space for travelling specialists and regulated health care professionals who do not need a permanent office. Consult rooms and a minor procedures room will let providers spend time in Bridgewater without having to maintain their own full-time facility.

Another feature will be a virtual care pod equipped with cameras and diagnostic equipment. This pod will let patients connect with nurse practitioners virtually, while giving the practitioner extra diagnostic information that would not be available during a regular phone consultation.

Jennery said the technology is meant to improve the quality of virtual assessments while making care more accessible in the local area.

The hub will also have a child-minding space run in partnership with the YMCA. This service will let patients leave their children in the facility for up to two hours while they attend medical appointments.

“It’s not daycare,” Jennery emphasized, describing it as a short-term service meant to remove another barrier to accessing care.

The facility will also offer space for smaller health care businesses and individual regulated professionals who may only need a clinical space a few days a week rather than running their own offices.

PFC expects its interior fit-up to take about three months, with the organization aiming for a soft opening near the end of 2026. Jennery said system navigation and the virtual care pod will be prioritized as soon as the necessary staff and infrastructure are ready.

The need is significant, he said, with just under 7,000 people in the area currently unattached to primary health care.

College grad credits volunteerism for her academic excellence

Joining the board offered her a unique window into public health, community navigation and preventive healthcare. During her time with the CHB, she took on multiple leadership roles, serving as board secretary, drafting advocacy letters, taking meeting minutes and leading recruitment efforts at community events across the region.

“Community health boards are a testament to the fact that we can accomplish more together than we could ever do alone,” she says, noting her tenure provided a vital platform for her to sharpen her networking and public speaking skills. “My experience with the Lunenburg County Community Health Board has been unique and beneficial to my future career.”

Unlike direct hospital volunteering, CHBs focus on wellness and health promotion at the grassroots level, supporting regional programs before patients ever require acute care. This proactive approach allowed Larissa to act as a community connector, linking residents to health and wellness resources across the South Shore.

She continues to volunteer at Bridgewater’s South Shore Regional Hospital, where she helps orient junior volunteers and supports friendly visitor programs.

Following a successful clinical placement, Larissa secured a position as a casual ward clerk in inpatient psychiatry at the Bridgewater hospital, while also taking on casual administrative roles in ambulatory care.

Larissa views her time on the community health board as an essential bridge that connected her personal passions with public service. She encourages other students and young professionals to consider stepping into CHB roles to build professional skills, expand their networks and make a tangible difference in community health.

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An interview with Nova Scotia’s oldest driver

WESTERN SHORE—Did you know Faith Hiltz, born March 27, 1926, is the oldest driver in Nova Scotia? At 100 years old, Hiltz has never shied away from what life has to offer her.

“I got my license and they had on to it that I was Nova Scotia’s oldest driver!”

Whether it be playing piano, painting, being a prominent fixture in her local community, or simply tending to her beautiful time capsule of a home, which is a spick-and-span abode adorned in bright velvets and plush carpet, Hiltz has always kept her schedule full and her life purposeful. “There’s

always something going on in my life”, she humbly stated as she sat across from me on her piano bench, posture perfect and legs tightly crossed.

It’s from this very piano bench that Hiltz - without her posture once faltering - shared a rough outline of events that led her to where she is now. She was born in Vancouver, travelling to Nova Scotia when she was only young with her three siblings and their parents. Her father, a Pentecostal minister, founded a church in Martin’s Point, and from there, Hiltz became an invaluable member of her community.

“Next year will be 70 years since my family started the church”, Hiltz proudly recalled. She also recollects the 36 years she spent as treasurer of the Fundy Camp Society in Baxter’s Harbour, from where she also has a cottage. She notes the big

New field and track in North Queens ready for light activity this fall

CALEDONIA – A new million-dollar track and sports field in Caledonia should be ready to use by October.

Matt Smith, a board member with North Queens Active Living, says contractors are doing “touch-ups” on the facility and the area around it, located behind North Queens Community School.

“There’s a certain warranty period just to make sure that the turf has established and is in good shape and then I think they’ll be done,” he said.

Volunteer firefighters with the North Queens Fire Association have helped keep the field watered this summer.

North Queens Active Living recently shared photos on its Facebook page of the progress of the work, which began last fall.

That was after the group secured \$800,000 from the Nova Scotia government and \$275,000 from the Region of Queens. They also received a land donation from a local resident worth about \$7,500 to expand the field. Local contractor Chad Bowers donated a concrete shot put pad.

Group members said the school and community needed a new sports field because the existing one wasn’t safe. School officials said it was especially dangerous after a rain because it didn’t drain properly. And years of damage from reckless ATV use left holes in the turf.

“It was just too uneven and muddy,” Smith says. “So yeah, it’s completely new, and it’s all turf and it seems like it’s really growing well and getting rooted, so that’s all good news.”

He said the field will probably see limited action this fall, but that it should be ready for full competitions by the spring.

“I think probably by track and field season we’ll be able to use it (more fully), and then have more tournaments and that sort of thing next summer.”

The 325-metre gravel track, regulation-sized natural soccer field and long jump pitch will mean that youth will be able to stay in their community to train and compete. Before this, they had to travel to Bridgewater or Liverpool or farther away to participate in outdoor school sports.

“For track and field, it’s going to be a huge, huge benefit. It’s going to be great for all sorts of activities. There’s a lot of interest in a soccer team, which we haven’t had in a long time. A neat thing that comes up is we get quite a few international students that come to the school, and a lot of them are into soccer. And we didn’t have the facility at all to really do that, so it may be a bigger draw for some, and great for building the program.”

When Queens County Olympian Jenna Martin was a student at the school, she had to travel to Bridgewater to train.

With a new rubberized track and artificial turf field at Liverpool Regional High School, along with a planned, purpose-built shot put pad in Brooklyn, young Queens County athletes will have more opportunity to follow in the footsteps of Olympians like Martin and Sarah Mitton.

“It really hits home that this is possible for them,” Smith said.

“You don’t have to be from a big centre, with all the facilities to make it. You can do it from North Queens, but you need to have something, so I think we have a really good spot for kids to start, and to be able to do the training, and not have to travel long distances, and then hopefully host some good events ourselves. It will be a big asset for the school, but also to the community. It’s going to be a great safe area for walking and for other sports too.”

The field is managed by the South Shore Regional Centre for Education, which will look after basic maintenance, Smith said, but North Queens Active Living will have to raise money for things like fertilizer for the turf or any additional features at the field like lighting or irrigation.

He said they’re planning a grand opening celebration sometime in September or October.

crowds that once amassed at the camp, and how in recent years, they’ve begun to dwindle.

Now attending church in Western Shore, Hiltz is the resident piano player, overflowing with talent. I was lucky enough to hear her play myself, and words wouldn’t do it justice. “I play it all by ear. I did take some piano lessons, so I have sort of an idea where the different keys are and the notes and things...I started playing in the church when I was 16 and I’ve been playing ever since in different churches.” She describes piano as a hobby that occupies much of her time, between practicing at home on her humble Wurlitzer, or playing for her local church.

When describing her general diet, rolled oats in the morning with a tangerine, homemade jam with “not much sugar!” on a slice of whole wheat bread, sliced peaches and cheese, and fruity herbal tea, I surmised if she was vegetarian. “Not entirely, but when it comes to meat, I have no desire to eat it. Eggs I’ll eat, I’ll eat some chicken, I’ll eat some fish, but when it comes to steaks or roasts, I don’t bother with it at all. And the processed meats I do not touch because there are chemicals in them that stay in your body.” Her guilty pleasures, which she prefaced are rare for her to indulge in at all, are chocolate bars and ginger ale.

Even after sharing the restrained effort, she puts in to keep healthy, she still thanks the Lord for her fate. “I do thank the Lord that He did watch over me and give me good health, and I put my trust in Him. You have to have someone to put your trust in, and you can find no better person than Him.”

“What are some of the highlights of your 100 years?” I asked her, to which she responded, after thinking long; “I’ve had a lot of highlights...there’ve been so many!” She never gave me a clear answer. Figures, seeing that the life of Faith Hiltz is a profound highlight in itself.

The world we want

Is the world the way you would like it to be? I can think of some possibilities for improvement; you probably can too. Let's try a less ambitious question, "Is your life the way you would like it to be?"

In Choice Theory, Dr. Glasser suggested that we create and maintain a set of internal pictures that reflect what we want. He calls it our "Quality World," our personal picture of the world we want.

At first glance, you might think that the Quality World is simply stuffed with pictures of things we want; perhaps new cars or houses or a million dollars. Indeed, Glasser does include things as one of the categories in our Quality Worlds.

There are other categories as well. One category is the people we want to be with. Who do we want to spend time with? Who do we want to respect us, love us, comfort us?

And then there's the category of ideas; what we value and what beliefs we hold. For example, we may have beliefs about how we should behave, about what political system is the best, or about how often your children should call you. What we believe has a place in our Quality World.

The Quality World idea can strike some as self-centered or selfish. However, that need not be the case. It's a tool, and tools can be used to achieve productive, positive results or destructive, even evil, results. How we use the tool matters.

If you're feeling vaguely dissatisfied with your life, then perhaps examining your Quality World could be time well spent. If you find the term "Quality World" awkward, just call it, "What I want."

Look at the three categories: things, people, and beliefs. Don't get side-tracked by the fact that you don't already have everything you want (it would be remarkable if you did) or if some of those wants are impossible. For now, just take stock. You could even write them down.

How is this useful? By consciously defining our wants, we're also defining our "don't-wants." It can help us define priorities. Then, we can focus on getting what we want and equally importantly, happily ignore what we don't want.

For example, you may want specific relationships with family, friends, coworkers, community members, even pets.

Why local animal shelters matter

For many people, an animal shelter is simply a place to adopt a new pet. But local shelters serve a much greater purpose. They provide a safety net for animals who are lost, abandoned, surrendered, injured, or simply have nowhere else to go. They help reduce animal overpopulation, promote responsible pet ownership and ensure that vulnerable animals in our communities receive the care they need.

For the communities of Lunenburg and Queens Counties, that safety net is SHAID Tree Animal Shelter, the only animal shelter serving these two counties.

SHAID, which stands for *Sheltering Helpless Animals in Distress*, was founded in 1986 by Julie Fach, the first female Dog Control Officer in Lunenburg County. What began with just \$53 and a desire to help animals in need has grown into an organization that now provides shelter, veterinary care, enrichment, and second chances to more than 500 animals each year.

Every day, animals arrive at SHAID needing help. Some are strays. Some have been surrendered due to changing family circumstances. Others require medical treatment, socialization, or simply a safe place to land while they wait for a new beginning.

Mid-August on the South Shore feels like standing at the edge of a golden field.

The summer's work is ripe, yet the air already carries the promise of change. As leaders, this is our moment to pause and ask: What has my team grown this season? What wins deserve celebration before we move into fall? What needs replanting or pruning so it doesn't drain energy later?

Human-centred leadership isn't about pushing harder; it's about tending wisely. This week, I'll share how the "Peak-End Rule" and small, intentional "micro-moments" can help you close summer strong, honour your team's effort, and set the soil for autumn momentum. The best leaders don't just manage the harvest, they prepare the ground for what's next.

Almost every owner/operator I know hits mid-August in the same posture: shoulders up around the ears, calendar full, running on the fumes of a good season and the sheer adrenaline of surviving it. Often forgotten in the blur, is that your team is running on those

Providing that care takes more than a building, it takes an entire community. SHAID receives no government funding, meaning that food, litter, veterinary care, medications, utilities, building maintenance and countless other expenses are supported through adoption fees, fundraising, donations, volunteers, and the generosity of community members.

And the need never stops. Every time an animal finds a home, space becomes available for another animal in need.

There are many ways people can help ensure SHAID remains here for years to come. Volunteers provide essential support with animal care, cleaning, socialization, fundraising and events. Donations help cover daily expenses and unexpected veterinary costs. Foster homes provide temporary care for ani-

mals who need a quieter environment, while monthly donations and planned estate gifts help ensure the shelter's long-term future.

Behind every successful adoption is a community that cared enough to make it possible.

One cat currently waiting for that second chance is Baller, a handsome three-year-old tuxedo gentleman with a quiet nature and a calm personality that is just beginning to shine.

Baller can be timid in new situations and prefers to take his time getting comfortable, but each day he grows a little more confident. He's even starting to discover the joy of play and seems to especially enjoy the company of men. Like many shelter animals, Baller simply needs patience, understanding, and someone willing to let him adjust at his own pace.

His story is a reminder of why local shelters matter. Without places like SHAID, and without the support of the community, cats like Baller might never have the opportunity to find safety, receive care, and eventually discover what it means to have a loving home.

Supporting a local animal shelter means ensuring that when an animal in our community needs somewhere to go, there is still a place ready to open its doors. Because every animal deserves a second chance, and every second chance begins with a community that cares.

who carried it?"

The teammate who quietly started training the newer ones without being asked. Name those things out loud, to the people who grew them, by name. A harvest uncelebrated is a harvest half wasted.

The American Avocet

I had originally planned to write a column on Two Days In The Life Of A Birder based on a trip that I made to Brier Island recently for a pelagic outing. That was before I found out about the discovery of an American avocet by Nick Von Mattzahn in Rose Bay at Sand Dollar Beach on Aug. 14.

I went to see this bird Aug. 17 with my friend Tim Curnew. We had great views of the avocet as well as many good views of a peregrine falcon harassing the hundreds of shorebirds that were present.

The American avocet nests in western Canada, Washington, Oregon, Idaho, Montana, Atlanta, Saskatchewan, Manitoba and south to California, east to Nevada, Utah, Colorado, New Mexico and to Texas east to North Dakota and South Dakota, Nebraska, Colorado, Oklahoma and it once nested in a few other states, but no longer.

Agriculture has eliminated the avocet from a lot of its former range. They

winter from California and Texas south to California and along the Pacific coast from Mexico to Guatemala. Migrants have continually visited the Atlantic coast from New Jersey to Florida. They also winter in Louisiana.

The American avocet is a strikingly handsome long-legged wading bird with a long slender, upcurved bill. The sexes are outwardly similar. The males are larger 42.5 to 46.25 cm long with the bill being 8.1 to 9.4 cm long and a wingspread of 67.5 to 95 cm.

There is a black and white pattern on the back and sides and in spring and summer a cinnamon head and neck. The head and neck at other times is greyish. The underparts and upper back are white. The slender upcurved bill turns up more in the females to 10 cm. The eyes are brown-red or carmine. The legs are long and bluish.

The American avocet eats nymphs, back swimmers, water boatmen, beetles, flies and their larvae, shrimps and other crustaceans.

Gerry Tyhuis and two other birders made a visit to Miller's Point Peace Park

where they saw 20 black-capped chickadees, 30 song sparrows, three eastern wood pewees, six yellow-rumped warblers, one white-breasted nuthatch, one belted kingfisher, one common loon and one pine warbler. This location is one of the few places where pine warblers breed every year. On Aug. 16 Nick Von Maltzahn saw three red knots at Crescent Beach Lunenburg County.

Large numbers of shorebirds are now going through at our beaches. At Sand Dollar Beach at Rose Bay Aug. 17, I had

320 semi-palmated sandpipers, 110 least sandpipers, one white-rumped sandpiper, 11 short-billed dowitchers and one greater yellowlegs.

At Oxner's Beach there were 13 black-bellied plovers, 16 short-billed dowitchers and 17 least sandpipers. Crescent Beach, Lunenburg County on that day produced 187 semi-palmated plovers, 24 black-bellied plovers, 29 short-billed dowitchers, 29 least sandpipers, three greater yellowlegs and four eastern willets. The eastern willet and western willet are going to be split into two separate species.

On Aug. 16 a crested caracara arrived in Pugwash. Ray Welsher located a common gallinule at the French Basin Trail. On Aug. 17 Mark Dennis discovered a Hudsonian Godwit at Port Howe. As of Aug. 18, the white ibis was still at Glace Bay. On Aug. 18 Jason Dain reported a laughing gull at Wallace. Several laughing gulls have showed up across the province over the past week.

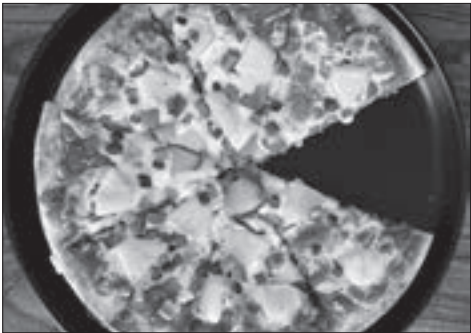

And then, honestly, look at what didn't take. Pruning isn't punishment; it's how a healthy thing keeps growing. Maybe it's the schedule system that broke down every Friday. The role that never quite fit the person in it. The small resentment you kept meaning to address and kept letting slide. The kindest thing a leader can do heading into September is, refuse to drag August's dead weight in with them.

Cut it clean, cut it warm, and give the soil room.

This is the difference between managing a season and leading one. The manager clears the tables and locks the door. The leader closes summer in a way that makes their people want to walk back through it in the fall. Tend the ending well, honour what grew, prune what didn't, and you won't just finish this season, you'll have already planted the next one.
