Bridgewater fire officials reflect on deadly apartment blaze, stress fire safety lessons

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BRIDGEWATER - Nearly a month after a fatal apartment fire on King Street took the life of Amitoj Kaur, Bridgewater fire officials say the blaze stands as a stark reminder of how quickly modern fires can overtake a building and why early detection remains one of the most vital lifesaving measures.

The June 10 fire destroyed the apartment building and claimed one life. While the cause of the fire is still under investigation, Deputy Chiefs Arden Weagle and Dave Hymers discussed the difficulties firefighters faced that day and the lessons they hope residents will remember.

Hymers said the fire spread with remarkable speed once it reached the building's exterior.

"The new style of construction on the exterior" allowed the flames to move rapidly, he explained. "The fire burned straight up, and it didn't stand a chance. The building didn't stand a chance."

It was fast and hot." He added that a covered deck at the rear of the building worsened conditions by trapping heat, leaving the flames with nowhere to go.

Although crews worked hard to contain the fire, the intensity of the blaze

made interior firefighting impossible in the early stages.

Many questions remain, including how the fire began and whether the basement apartment met building regulations.

Weagle said those answers will come through the ongoing investigation led by provincial fire investigators and police.

"It's still under investigation," he said. "We can't speak on it."

The building itself dated back to the 1960s, and Weagle said its age will likely be considered when investigators assess how the fire developed.

"The lumber is well aged," he said, noting that the building's age played a part in how the structure caught and burned.

Interestingly, Hymers pointed out that older construction may have offered a slight advantage under the circumstances.

He said newer buildings, especially those built within the past decade using modern engineered materials, can sometimes become fully involved in fire even faster than older ones.

For residents living in basement apartments, Hymers said working smoke alarms remain the single most important protection.

"Early detection is the best thing."

He also urged residents to have an escape plan and to be familiar with fire safety requirements for basement apartments.

"There is a huge education in what happened here," Hymers said.

The same principles apply to both houses and apartment buildings, he added. Occupants should ensure smoke alarms are functioning, identify multiple exits when possible, and know what to do before an emergency occurs.

The fire also raised questions about why some neighbouring fire departments responded while others did not. There were more than 10 departments that attended.

Weagle said those decisions are based on careful co-ordination rather than simple distance.

Officials consider staffing levels, equipment, and coverage capacity of surrounding departments before calling for help. During the King Street fire, crews already had an adequate water supply, so additional tankers and engines were not needed. What they needed most was personnel.

Because the fire happened around lunchtime, many volunteer departments were already dealing with reduced daytime staffing. Larger, neighbouring departments were better able to send several firefighters while still maintaining coverage in their own communities.

Beyond the operational challenges, both deputy chiefs acknowledged the emotional strain incidents like this can place on firefighters.

Hymers said firefighters approach every emergency determined to save lives and protect property, making a fatal outcome especially painful.

"They're there to do a job, and they take pride in that," he said. "In an instance like this where there was a loss of life, some will take that to heart." He noted that Nova Scotia has specialized peer support resources available to help firefighters process traumatic events.

For Weagle, the impact is even stronger in a town the size of Bridgewater.

"When it's a small community, everyone knows everyone," he said. "It hits a little harder than others."

Liverpool call centre company loses latest bid to avoid paying former employees

LIVERPOOL – The Nova Scotia government has dismissed an appeal from a company to pay its former Liverpool employees almost \$200,000 after officials ruled it didn't give proper layoff notice.

In a May 1, 2025 ruling, Nova Scotia's Labour Standards division ruled the Global Empire Corporation call centre did not give the required notice to 74 employees when it fired them on March 15, 2024, three weeks after issuing layoff notices, and before the original termination date of April 19.

Under Nova Scotia's Labour Standards Code, the company had to give at least eight weeks' notice, or pay instead of notice. Some 69 employees are still waiting for severance pay. Each of them is entitled to about five weeks' pay for a total of \$193,115.04.

Global Empire closed the Liverpool operation shortly after the 2025 ruling. Company CEO Moe Nashman, or Moe Najmeddine as he appears in labour board documents, appealed the order on Oct. 3, 2025, after the deadline.

Former employee Debra Lalonde, who filed the original complaint with Nova Scotia's Labour Standards division, said in an interview that she and others are frustrated, but she's not giving up.

"I'm hopeful, but given the lack of support I've had from my local MLA (Kim Masland), and the region just wash their hands of any accountability, there's not any support for, or

advocacy for us.

"I'd like to see workers' rights enforced, the director's decision upheld, and if we have these rights, then the government should be honouring them. Otherwise, they're not worth the paper they're written on."

Lalonde herself is owed about \$2,800. She has contacted Nova Scotia's ombudsman, had NDP MLAs take up the cause at Province House and recently asked for the issue to be put on the agenda at the legislature's public accounts committee.

"I've heard first-hand just how hard people have had recovering from this," she says.

"A lot of us were paycheck-to-paycheck. And you know, finding out that tomorrow's your last-day payday is devastating. My friends out in Milton, they both worked there. They almost lost their home, they are still trying to recover."

Liverpool was Global Empire's only Canadian location. It signed a five-year lease with the Region of Queens in December 2021 at the municipally owned Liverpool Business Development Centre. The region renewed the lease in February 2024, two weeks before the layoff notices. That lease has never been made public.

An official with Nova Scotia's Department of Labour, Skills and Immigration has said it can't force the company to pay because it has no assets or funds in Nova Scotia. It has asked the Alberta government to enforce it on its behalf.

Although an ask to speak to a

BARRINGTON – Members of the Barrington RCMP Detachment are investigating a fatal collision that occurred on Hwy. 103 in Barrington.

On June 26, at approximately 6:45 a.m., RCMP, fire services, and EHS responded to a report of a two-vehicle collision between exits 29 and 30.

Officers learned that a Hyundai Elantra crossed the centreline and collided with a tractor trailer.

The driver and only occupant of

the car, a 37-year-old man of Shelburne, was pronounced deceased at the scene.

The driver and only occupant of the tractor trailer, a 50 year-old man of Shelburne County, suffered non-life-threatening injuries and was transported to hospital by EHS.

An RCMP collision reconstructionist attended the scene. The investigation is ongoing with support from the Nova Scotia Medical Examiner Service.

Girls at Bat program continues to grow

BRIDGEWATER – The Girls At Bat program, hosted by the YMCA of South-west Nova Scotia in partnership with Toronto Blue Jays Care Foundation, continues to grow.

With more than 45 girls, the highest number ever, taking the field this year, this summer promises to be a hit.

Kim Roy, is the co-ordinator and the childcare manager for the area YMCA.

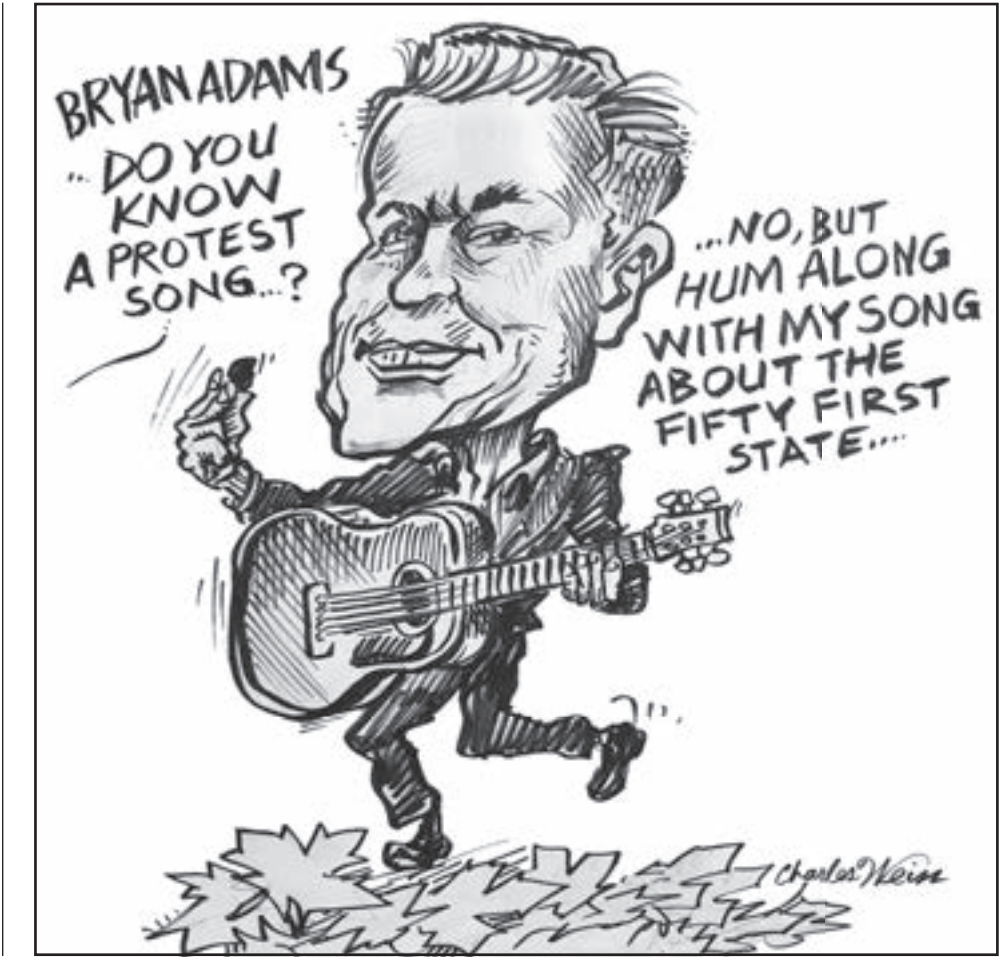
“It’s an introductory baseball program for females who wouldn’t normally be athletic children. We mostly focus on self-confidence and being a part of a team,” she said.

“It’s more about teaching girls to believe in themselves and a bit less about baseball, but we do throw some baseball in. They just really love the team atmosphere and learning a bit about the ins and outs of baseball.”

The program takes place every Wednesday and it is for ages five to 12 years – split into two different age groups: five to eight and nine to 12. The first age group runs from 4-5 p.m. and the second, from 5-6 p.m. on the LaHave Street Field on Glen Allan Drive.

The numbers have varied over the years. Last year there were 40 registered and there are now 45 or more girls hitting the field.

“This will be our sixth year and over the last three years we are starting to see



more coming back, so we can actually focus a bit more on baseball and learning how to play,” said Roy, who added that during the first couple of years they didn’t even play an actual baseball game until the final day.

She also said that this year she has five

returning coaches which definitely helps the program in many ways.

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Downtown Liverpool sees mini-boom, hope for turnaround

LIVERPOOL – When Peter and Stephanie Doggett were considering opening a business on the South Shore, they thought Liverpool was a good bet.

The couple had relatives and a cottage in the area and spent a lot of time here over the past 25 years. They stepped back from their businesses in Dartmouth, but wanted to stay occupied.

So, they opened The Channel on May 1 in the old Scotiabank building on Main Street. What began as a wine bar and charcuterie spot quickly evolved into more of a full-service restaurant, with about 20 employees.

“Liverpool has been dear to us for a long time,” Stephanie says.

“And I see a lot of potential here. I think we’re just on the cusp of things really coming together here, and attracting new residents and more tourism, and I think we’re just so close right now.”

The Doggetts are not alone. More entrepreneurs are taking a chance on the Port of the Privateers.

New restaurants, shops and real estate developments are taking shape in or near the downtown core.

Wildflower Makery & Design opened on June 25, joining other, established businesses like Shore Thing Studio and Emporium.

The owners of Rhubarb Restaurant in Peggy’s Cove moved their business to an old restaurant space on Main Street and have been renovating it

with a promise to re-open soon as Hazel’s.

Developer Eric Fry is turning the old Stedman’s building, which last housed a real estate company, into a 14-unit apartment building.

And two different private housing developments are planned for the Mount Pleasant area, with potentially up to 325 new houses and apartments. That’s on top of a 30-unit affordable co-op housing development and another 10-unit building geared toward health-care workers.

It’s a mini business boom that has people like Katharina Cochrane optimistic.

The president of the South Queens Chamber of Commerce says more people are moving to the area, more development is happening, and entrepreneurs are noticing.

Since Bowater Mersey closed in 2012, local, independent businesses have struggled to attract enough customers to stay open.

But some, like Five Girls Baking and Memories Cafe and Eatery, have endured. And Cochrane says the tide may be turning.

She points to the new outdoor pool being built at Queens Place Emera Centre and the new Queens Manor nursing home being built nearby, a new wind farm development on its way in Milton and more businesses moving into Port Mersey Commercial Park in nearby Brooklyn.

Cochrane and her husband Larry are also betting on a rebound. They’re behind Dauphinee Fields, a housing development in the Mount Pleasant area near downtown that could see up to 70 new homes.

She says people are starting to realize Liverpool has a lot of the same amenities as Lunenburg or Mahone Bay, but where businesses tend to stay open year-round, instead of seasonally.

Rhubarb
Gazpacho

INGREDIENTS

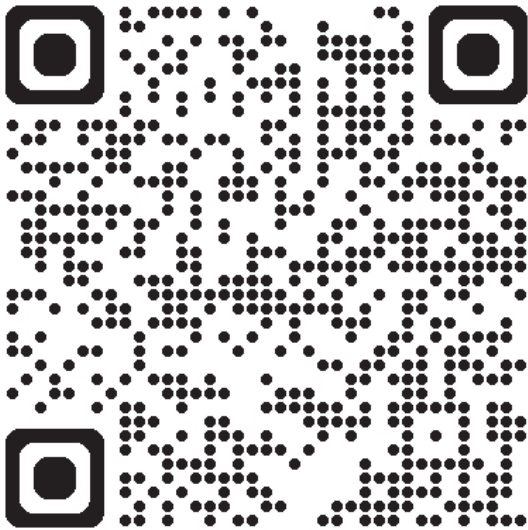
- 2 cups fresh strawberries, hulled
- 1 cup rhubarb, chopped
- 1 cup cucumber, peeled and chopped
- 1/4 cup extra virgin olive oil
- 2 tbsp honey or maple syrup (optional, to taste)
- 1 tbsp lemon juice
- 1/4 cup fresh basil or mint
- 1/4 tsp salt to taste
- black pepper as needed
- cold water to thin

PREPARATION

1. Place chopped rhubarb in a small saucepan with 2-3 tablespoons water. Heat gently for 3-4 minutes until just softened but still bright. Cool completely.
2. In a blender, combine strawberries, cooled rhubarb, cucumber, olive oil, lemon juice, basil or mint, salt, and pepper.
3. Add honey or maple syrup to taste (optional)
4. Blend until smooth, adding cold water a splash at a time until you reach a pourable consistency. Chill at least 1 hour.
5. Pour into small bowls or glasses. Garnish with sliced strawberries, cucumber, herbs, or edible flowers.

For a creamier version add a spoonful of Greek yogurt. For a light summer meal, pair with a spinach, strawberry and feta salad, or serve as a starter for a richer meal.

Breaking ground in Shelburne

Prep work begin for new six-station dialysis unit

SHELBURNE – Site preparations are getting underway at the Roseway Hospital property to prepare for the installation of a new, six-station dialysis unit.

It was announced by the province in 2024 that three such units would be built in the province at Roseway, All Saints Springhill Hospital and Strait Richmond Hospital in Evanston.

These units would contain six stations each and would use a construction approach called Design for Manufacture and Assembly (DfMA), which will see the units be built off-site and assembled on hospital grounds. This would reduce construction timelines.

They are being put together in a Nova Scotia facility and they are being built for an approximate cost of \$31 million.

Currently, there are 19 dialysis sites in the province. It is expected that each unit would be able to provide up to 72 treatments per week.

“It’s extremely exciting. We are very happy for our patient population in these three areas,” said Angela Shorter, Director of Operations for the Nova Scotia Health Renal program.

Speaking to the new unit being built in Shelburne specifically, Shorter said that the closest units to there would be Liverpool or Yarmouth. Patients would normally have to travel between two to four hours a day, three times a week to receive care.

“So, this is a huge deal to them. It’s going to give them a lot of time back to spend more time with their family and loved ones.”

Shorter says that the doors will open at all three locations in early 2027, with the Springhill location expected to open first followed by Shelburne and the Evanston openings to follow shortly.

FOR HOSPITAL USERS IN SHELBURNE:

- Patients can continue to access all services at Roseway Hospital, as well as the Shelburne Community Health Centre and Shelburne Family Practice as usual;
- Construction crews and equipment will begin onsite preparations in the rear area, near the Shelburne Community Health Centre family practice building – you are asked to park in the front hospital parking lot;
- and, allow extra time when going for an appointment in case of construction-related traffic delays.

Memorial golf tournament exceeds expectations

\$40K raised to fund two service dogs

BRIDGEWATER – A sold-out field of 116 golfers took to the Osprey Ridge Golf Course in Bridgewater for the first Jim Davis Memorial Golf Tournament June 27.

The tournament raised \$39,630.25 for the volunteer-driven organization, Paws Fur Thought, that advocates and fundraises to pair service dogs with veterans suffering from PTSD.

The tournament caught the eye of an online donor who did not like that uneven number and donated to round the number to \$40,000. This number exceeded the goal of raising \$30,000 to fund two dogs.

Organizers are thankful to the 25 corporate sponsors and the many volunteers from the Order of St. George Atlantic Priory; the UN/NATO group and the Bridgewater Legion, that made the event a success.

Paws Fur Thought was founded in 2013, by Medric and Jocelyn Cousineau and is a recognized service dog provider and supported by Wounded Warriors Canada. They do not receive funding or support from any level of government and It takes between 13 to 18 months to train a puppy from birth to placement with each dog costing upwards of \$15,000.

The incredible statistic is that since the organization has been pairing veterans with service

dogs, no veterans have lost their lives to suicide.

The tournament has been in the works since early 2026 to not only get a full complement of golfers but also to secure corporate sponsorship from hole sponsors, providing the food for the event and the prizes both for the golfers to bid on in the silent auction and to take home during the awards presentation just to name a few of the tasks.

The day began cool and uncertain, but the sun soon broke through, creating perfect weather for golf. The course featured several activities, including four hole-in-one challenges with prizes of two \$10,000 cash awards, a \$5,000 lawn mower, and an additional \$3,000 cash prize.

When asked “where do we go from here” organizers indicated that they hope to secure a presenting sponsor next which will take place on June 19, 2027 which then will allow the tournament to fund three dogs.

Mersey River Wind could be operational by December

MILTON – Customers could be hooked up to the South Shore’s first major wind power producer by the end of the year.

“We hope to have the first turbines up and running in December, but we will gradually produce more energy as more turbines come online into the spring,” Renewall Energy Inc. President Dan Roscoe said in a recent interview. Roscoe sent a construction update to the company’s newsletter subscribers on June 25.

Renewall is building the Mersey River Wind farm in Milton. It will sell power directly to customers, using the Nova Scotia Power grid, promising slightly lower but more stable rates. Renewall is owned by renewable energy developer Roswall.

The \$500-million project will see 33 wind turbines built on 80 hectares of Crown land near the Mersey

River. Vestas Canada is building the turbines for the project.

The federal government announced in February that the farm secured a \$206-million loan from the Canada Infrastructure Bank and could qualify for up to \$122.5 million in clean energy investment tax credits.

The Mersey River site will be capable of providing electricity for up to 50,000 homes. Roscoe has said it will produce about five per cent of Nova Scotia’s power once it’s fully operational.

It’s the first project under Nova Scotia’s renewable-to-retail pro-

gram, which allows green-energy producers to sell power directly to customers.

Roscoe says that about 100 workers are on site now, pouring substation foundations, preparing transmission lines and installing wind turbine pads.

“As we work on a project like this, we work our way through in phases. First, we build the roads. Then we build power lines and foundations and so forth. So, we are working towards having the wind turbines arrive in about three months, by the end of September.”

Renewall has signed up more than 30 commercial and industrial customers, including White Point Beach Resort, the Region of Queens Municipality, Killam Apartment REIT, Old Orchard Inn, Nova Scotia Liquor Corporation and Halifax Regional Municipality.

Roscoe said he’s unsure exactly how many potential residential customers have signed up early, but he said it’s “in the thousands”. He said people are eager for a choice of “who they buy electricity from in Nova Scotia for the first time.”

“We have a beautiful theatre. We have a beautiful rink for families. We have all three schools in this community, from Primary to high school. We’ve got the surfing, beaches. So really, we’ve got a lot going for us. We just were never so good after the mill closed about promoting (the town). And so now it seems like people are seeing us more and appreciating us more.”

Shani Beadle, co-owner of Main and Mersey Dining Room and Coffee Bar, says that potential is why she and Andreas Arnmar opened their business on Main Street in 2017 and moved and expanded a few doors down in 2023.

“I think that having a variety of businesses will make the town a destination,” she says. “I’ve seen it hap-

pen before, where one restaurant and one shop leads to several, and then the whole town becomes a destination. But it’s important to have a variety of different businesses.”

She says that’s vital for businesses who see a slowdown in the winter months.

“But you know, if we keep growing, we will be a Lunenburg or a Mahone Bay, because we’re just the next town down. That’s why we picked this place, because we’re the town that had the opportunity, because it wasn’t developed yet.”

As for the Doggetts, they want to keep developing The Channel. It’s one of the reasons they hired Stephanie Miller Vincent, who has decades of experience managing restaurants, events and other businesses.

Miller Vincent says that new businesses can benefit existing enter-

prises, by bringing new people to the area.

“I think new business of any sort just breathes life into everybody else that’s already here and open,” she says.

“One business is not a destination. Destinations happen when there’s more than one of whether it’s a restaurant, a shop, or whatever. You can then spend a day, an afternoon, stay for a weekend, vacation, whatever it might be.”

Stephanie Doggett says their recent oyster night was a sellout. And they have plans to do more with The Channel, to help attract more customers to downtown Liverpool.

“We’ve met a lot of newcomers to the area, people from all over North America, who have relocated here. I mean, they’re absolutely thrilled to be here.”

“We have customers from Yarmouth to Sydney,” he said.

He said he’s unsure which customers will come online first, but that crews will work through the summer to get ready for the first shipment of windmills in September.

“It’s pretty exciting. ... We’re right in the middle of construction, trying to keep things on time and on budget, so it’s a busy summer.”

UPDATE:

It was announced on Friday that a 10-year agreement has been reached between the province and Renewall that will see them provide electricity delivered to public housing across the province.

According to a news release, the agreement will start in 2027 and should reduce greenhouse gas emissions by more than 37,000 tonnes annually, reducing electricity costs between \$25 to \$50 million over the 10 years.

Looking beyond the diagnosis: understanding Feline Leukemia Virus

When a cat tests positive for Feline Leukemia Virus (FeLV), many people assume their chances of finding a loving home are slim. Unfortunately, the diagnosis often carries a stigma that doesn't tell the whole story.

The reality is that many FeLV-positive cats live happy, fulfilling lives for years with proper care. They still love to play, cuddle, explore sunny windows and become devoted companions. One such cat is Snoopy, a handsome neutered male currently waiting for his forever home at SHAID Tree Animal Shelter. Snoopy doesn't let his diagnosis define him, and neither do the staff who care for him every day. He's incredibly friendly, loves spending time with people, and has even been raised with dogs, making him an excellent companion for a home with canine family members. What Snoopy needs most isn't special treatment, it's someone willing to see past the letters "FeLV" and recognize the wonderful cat behind them.

Feline Leukemia Virus is one of the

most common infectious diseases affecting cats. It attacks the immune system, which can make infected cats more susceptible to illness over time. While FeLV is a serious condition, it is not an immediate death sentence. Many cats remain healthy for years, especially when they receive regular veterinary care, eat a nutritious diet and live in a low-stress indoor environment.

Unlike viruses that spread easily through the environment, FeLV requires close contact between cats. It is most commonly transmitted through mutual grooming, sharing food and water dishes, sharing litter boxes, bite wounds, or from a mother cat to her kittens. The virus affects only cats, it cannot be passed to people, dogs, or other animals.

Because of this, FeLV-positive cats should live indoors where they are protected from additional illnesses and cannot spread the virus to other cats. They are best suited as the only cat in the home or living with other FeLV-positive cats. Many can thrive in homes with dogs, making them an excellent option for families looking to add a solo feline

companion to an existing canine household.

Prevention is equally important. Keeping cats indoors, testing new cats before introducing them into the household, and getting your cat vaccinated are critical in helping to reduce the spread of this virus.

At SHAID, every cat is valued for who they are, not simply for their medical history. While Snoopy's FeLV status means he needs a specific type of home, it doesn't change his loving personality or his ability to bring joy to a family.

Cats like Snoopy remind us that compassion sometimes means looking beyond a diagnosis and seeing the individual waiting to be loved.

Snoopy may need a special home, but what he's really looking for is the same thing every shelter animal hopes for, a family to love him, a comfortable place to rest, and someone who sees him for the remarkable cat he truly is.

Caring for animals with medical needs often comes with additional expenses, and community support makes that care possible. SHAID's monthly Rafflebox 50/50 fundraiser is now live, with proceeds helping provide food, shelter, veterinary care, and enrichment for animals like Snoopy. Staying alive

Have you ever taken a CPR course? Or maybe you can recall music from the '70s? If so, I imagine that the words, "Staying Alive" bring a little tune to mind. Feel free to hum along as you read.

Staying alive is a pretty potent motivator, wouldn't you say? In Choice Theory, it's called a basic need; the basic need for survival/security.

For some of us, this need is so basic that it makes all the others: love/belonging, power/recognition, freedom and fun, seem almost frivolous by comparison. Those needs don't mean much

if you can't survive, right?

You might think that what we require to satisfy this security/survival need is obvious. We're all human. So, we all need essentially the same things: air to breathe, water to drink, food to eat, a way to protect ourselves from the elements. Pretty straightforward, isn't it?

However, “assuming” something is straightforward is often our first mistake in many situations.

Even though we have the same basic needs, we still have differences. Different people have different strengths of each need. And there are differences in what satisfaction looks like. What you find satisfying is likely not quite the same as what I see as satisfying. These differences can lead to misunderstandings, resentments, fears and conflicts.

Imagine a couple; we'll call them Eric and Erica. They've been having conflicts over some basic choices; primarily about how to spend their time and money. This conflict is new for them. In the early days of their relationship, they seemed to agree on everything. Now, not so much. Why would that change?

Like many couples, Eric and Erica have never really discussed what they want in terms of security and survival. Each assumed that the other, being a sensible person, the person they love and plan to share their life with, would want the same things they do. Wouldn't they?

Upon examination though, it turns out that there are some differences! Erica looks at security as essential; it's her top priority. She has an eye on the future, looking out for the security of

the children they hope to have. She recognizes the possibility that someone might get sick or injured.

Then, there's the state of the world; it seems that everywhere you look, you see disasters or looming crises. And even though they are young now, she's already concerned about how they will live when they become seasoned citizens!

Eric has a more relaxed view of it all. He's making good money and can't imagine that this would ever come to an end. He feels pretty much on top of the world in terms of his career, his beautiful wife and a future that is bright indeed. In Eric's view, we're young now, and there is so much to do and to see! The great-crested flycatcher

Bird Notes

Kevin Lantz found a great-crested flycatcher at the end of the Rhodenizer Road in Cookville on June 20.

This bird at the time was vocal and active and it was thought that it might stay in the area and attempt breeding. A few others went to try for the bird but were not successful in seeing it.

In the past I had heard this species, but had not actually seen one. I went on June 24 and was lucky to find it, both hearing it call and capturing photos. I guess that I was doubly lucky as it was the last time that the bird was seen.

The great-crested flycatcher nested from Saskatchewan, east to New Brunswick and Maine, south to Oklahoma, Texas, the Gulf Coast and Florida. They winter from Florida, rarely from Texas, Mexico, south to Columbia.

They have strayed elsewhere in the winter to Alberta, Montana, Wyoming, Colorado, Arizona and Nova Scotia. They are now breeding in Nova Scotia, but there still are not many here.

The great-crested flycatcher is 20 to 22.5 cm long with a wingspread of 31.9 to 35 cm. They are olive brown above with a head crest. The breast is pale gray as is the throat and there is a yellow abdomen. There is a long rufous tail and a cinnamon color in the wings. There are white wing bars.

The great-crested flycatcher darts swiftly from a perch to snatch dragonflies and other insects out of the air. They also take prey from or near the ground and from crevices of bark.

They eat 52 kinds of beetles, also bees, wasps, sawflies, houseflies, stable flies, mosquitoes and grasshoppers, crickets, katydids, bugs and many adult moths and butterflies. They eat caterpillars, cicada, spiders, mulberries, pokeberries, blackberries, raspberries, wild black cherries, wild grapes and several other berries. This species can live up to 11 years.

Another good bird at the location of the flycatcher is cliff swallows, which are not easy to come by in Lunenburg County now. There are also bobolinks

present. It is always a treat to listen to their tinkling call.

On June 28, Miguel Morales discovered a yellow-crowned night heron at White Point. I procrastinated in going to see this bird and by the time I did go it was gone. Steven Morris, Paul Morf and I located two razorbills off Hell’s Point. We also found at least five Nelson’s sparrows at Oxner’s Beach on that day.

We saw an American wigeon with six young on Kingsburg Pond. This is possibly the first confirmed nesting for that species there. I, personally, have not seen any successful nesting for the American wigeon in Lunenburg County in the past.

On the way across from Yarmouth

to Maine on the ferry, Paul Morf sighted a south polar skua. On June 29, Miguel Morales was visiting at a friend’s place in Blockhouse and saw two eastern bluebirds. One was an adult and the other, a young one.

On June 28, Logan LaLonde reported a Mississippi kite on Brier Island. A white ibis continues in Glace Bay. On June 29, JD Bharvad located a Eurasian wigeon at Florence Little Pond Beach. He also had a lesser black-backed gull at the Point Aconi Lighthouse.

On June 30 he found three short-billed dowitchers, and a flock of lesser yellowlegs at Big Pond Cape Breton. On July 1 he had 13 lesser yellowlegs and a semi-palmated plover at Schooner Pond in Cape Breton.

Halifax Municipality had several little blue herons, a black-necked stilt, and a green heron. The Northeast Mainland reported a brown booby. In the Northwest Mainland there had been an eastern meadowlark.

Rarer species in Southwest Nova Scotia included harlequin ducks, a field sparrow, an eastern warbling vireo, a little blue heron, a willow flycatcher, 38 short-billed dowitchers, a northern shoveler, a great egret and a whimbrel.

In the Valley, both semi-palmated sandpiper and semi-palmated plover were observed and an eastern warbling vireo.

I came across a list on LinkedIn last week that I haven’t been able to shake.

Someone had laid out five hospital-ity jobs that are quietly disappearing in 2026. According to the post, anyone in one of those roles has somewhere between 12 and 24 months before the job looks very different or disappears.

Then came five new jobs starting to show up in their place. Titles like “AI concierge supervisor” and “guest data governance lead.” Roles that, as the post put it, don’t have a real job description yet and apparently, that’s supposed to be the good news, getting in early, before anyone’s defined the rules.

I’ll be honest. My first reaction was the same as most. A little unsettled, a little curious, and quietly grateful none of those five disappearing jobs had my name on them.

But the more I sat with it, the more I realized the list was asking the wrong question. At least, the question I wanted answered wasn’t on it anywhere and it’s not a question that only mat-ters to hotels and restaurants.

It matters to anyone running a busi-ness where people show up and serve other people whether that’s a salon, a gym, a garage, a retail counter, a tour boat.

Here’s what I know after more than 30 years in the service industry, on both sides of the table: none of those “disappearing” jobs were ever just the task written in the job description or the shift written on the schedule.

The night auditor isn’t just bal-ancing the books, they were often the only person up at 2 a.m. who’d notice something was wrong before a guest ever said a word. The person inspecting rooms wasn’t simply fol-lowing a checklist.

They were doing a small, quiet act of care that nobody ever wrote down, because it didn’t need to be written down, it just needed to be done, by someone who cared enough to do it.

This is not just a hospitality story. The same thing is true of the stylist who notices a regular client seems off today before they’ve said a word. The mechanic who double checks some-thing that wasn’t on the work order because it didn’t feel right. The retail associate who remembers what a cus-

tom-er bought last time without being told to. None of that lives in any job description, in any industry. It’s the difference between a business that runs on tasks and one that runs on people who care.

It shows up in whether people stay. It shows up in whether a customer comes back. It shows up, eventually, in the bottom line, just usually too late for anyone to connect the dots.

So, when I think about what’s com-ing for businesses here on the South Shore, across hospitality, tourism, retail, and every other service-based business, the question I’d ask isn’t “what’s about to be automated.” It’s this: do you actually know what your people are doing all day, or do you only know what their job title says they’re doing?

That gap is where good businesses get hurt without ever seeing it coming. You automate a task to save time or money, and without meaning to, you also remove the one thing that was quietly holding your culture together. Nobody decided to do that, it just hap-pened, because nobody had taken the time to understand what the job really was in the first place.

The businesses that come through this next stretch in good shape won’t be the ones with the most advanced technology. They’ll be the ones led by people who took the time to under-stand their own operation well enough to know what to protect, what to re-design, and what was safe to hand off.

That’s not a technology question. That’s a leadership question. And it’s one every owner, whether you run an inn, a shop, a boat tour, or a wine bar gets to answer for yourself, starting now, before someone else answers it for you.

Would you want to work for you?

This week, I’d add one more layer to that question: would you even know which parts of the job were worth saving?

Liverpool call centre company loses latest bid to avoid paying former employees

government official was requested, there was no response from anyone before our deadline.

Najmeddine claimed the company’s assets are in Phoenix, so officials say their hands are tied.

According to its website, its head office is in Edmonton, where Najmeddine is listed as a realtor with Global Empire Corporation.

The company said it needed to reduce its workforce because it lost its largest client, Lifeline Systems.

The most recent labour board ruling of June 25 upholds the original order. It says that Global Empire was “largely a single client company” and that it

should have known there was trouble when Lifeline was in arrears within six months of signing a deal.

“It suffered from being subject to a pattern of unpaid invoices which were not addressed by Global Empire until it was too late and Lifeline Systems had little incentive to abide by the Agreement. Global Empire had control over the enforcement of the Agreement and failed to do so. This was not a sudden unexpected event,” the ruling said.

“Global Empire knew from day one that the loss of Lifeline Systems would mean the drastic and immediate reduction of its workforce, knowledge that informed how it should conduct its business.”

The ruling said the company failed to prove it can’t

“meet its obligations.”

“Even if Global Empire had produced sufficient evidence to support its financial inability to pay, its failure to enforce its own Agreement by letting its single most important client fall into significant arrears while failing to heed Lifeline Systems’ explicit indications that it would end the Agreement, simply does not meet the test showing a cause outside of its control or the sufficient exercise of due diligence to foresee and avoid it.”

Lalonde says she hopes Najmeddine pays his former employees.

“I would just tell him, please respect our Canadian rights as workers, our Nova Scotia rights as workers and honour the director’s order. We are owed that money.”

Two other employees, who filed their own claims for severance pay, also had their rulings upheld.

As for community wells, Mayor Scott Christian said in an interview that he expects the first of those to be open this year.

The municipality would partner with a community organization with their own well to provide potable water to nearby residents. It would lease use of the well from the group and look after testing to give the public free access.

“My expectation is that there’s going to be at least a couple more community wells available for folks to be accessing potable water throughout the county if and when we end up with dry wells and dry conditions later in the summer and into the fall,” Christian said.

Residents can already use the municipally owned Cowie Well in Milton. Some community groups, like the Seaside Centre in Beach Meadows, have an outdoor tap for local residents to fill up on water by donation.
