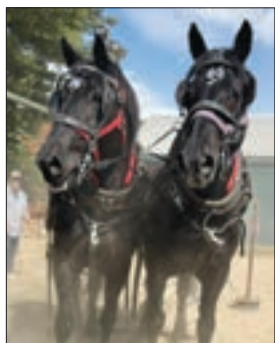

Dares Lake dam breach stabilized

LUNENBURG - Crews have managed to contain and stabilize a breach at the Dares Lake dam near Lunenburg, but residents and businesses, as of our deadline Friday (Sept. 4 at noon), still being asked to limit their water use to essential needs while the municipality works to restore reservoir levels.

Jamie Deans, media and communications for the Town of Lunenburg, said that crews along with heavy equipment have been at the site to reinforce the damaged dam and direct water flows around the affected infrastructure.

To divert water away from the pumphouse, berms and trenches have been put in place, which has allowed crews to reach the facility and start electrical and mechanical assessments. Those assessments are still ongoing.

The breach has impacted the pumping infrastructure: two out of the water utility's three pumps are now working, though neither is running at full capacity. The third pump is still out of service, and town staff are working to replace it as soon as possible.

Despite the damage, the utility's ability to treat potable water has not been affected by the incident.

One of the main concerns early on was how much water is available in the municipal system and how quickly it can be replenished.

Deans noted on Friday that the combination of water conservation efforts and having two pumps back in service has started to make a difference. Reservoir levels, which had dropped, have improved slightly as the Utility gradually increases production.

Still, the town is keeping its water conservation measures in place while it waits for reservoir levels to reach a more stable point.

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Tancook field station brings white shark research to the heart of a Nova Scotia fishing community

MAHONE BAY - In the waters around the Tancook Islands, researchers are trying to learn more about one of the ocean’s most well-known predators.

The Tancook Gardens Marine Field Station was set up to support research on white sharks and their ecosystem in Nova Scotia, while also giving students and researchers a chance to experience marine science firsthand.

The idea for the station was partly inspired by the Bimini Biological Field Station in the Bahamas, which was started by shark researcher Samuel Gruber. During his academic training, Professor Nigel Hussey, who is now co-director of the Tancook field station, spent time at the Bimini station and was attracted to its practical, hands-on approach.

Unlike more traditional biological field stations, the Tancook model is based on living and working out in the field.

Researchers can stay on the islands for weeks at a time, joining a small team where everyone helps with the daily running of the station. That might mean doing research on the water one day, fixing

equipment or boat engines the next, or even taking a turn cooking meals for everyone.

For Hussey, that kind of immersion is key to understanding marine animals.

“It’s not just the numbers,” he said, pointing out that modern technology can give researchers huge amounts of information about animal movements, but they might still have to guess about behavior from the data. Being out on the water lets scientists experience the same conditions the animals are living in.

The station has another aim as well: to bring scientists and the local community closer together.

The field station has been intentionally woven into the Tancook Islands, a community with strong ties to fishing and the surrounding waters. Hussey said fishermen offer important knowledge for the research, like advice on where to put equipment, where to set up moorings, and which times of year are best for fieldwork.

The hope is that this partnership can help close a long-standing gap between scientific research and the people who work on the water.

“It’s really important because if you want to study these animals, then you need to be in the field with them,” Hussey said.

The station started to take shape in 2021, with 2022 as its first year of operation, and researchers have chosen to move slowly as they build relation-

ships within the community. White shark research is currently the focus at the station.

One part of the work involves capture tagging, where researchers catch white sharks under controlled conditions so they can attach several tags and collect detailed information about their movements. This also gives the team a chance to do health checks, with a veterinarian taking blood samples and running about 25 different tests on each shark.

Researchers are also using remote tagging, which lets them tag sharks without physically catching them. Cameras placed on the sea floor are used for photo identification, so individual sharks can be matched with existing databases.

This work is helping researchers learn about the movements and population patterns of white sharks throughout the Northwest Atlantic, including the connection between Atlantic Canada and Cape Cod.

Mahone Bay is especially valuable because it lies along a key migration route. White sharks heading north into Atlantic Canada in late spring and summer pass through the outer islands of Mahone Bay. They travel through the area again in the fall as they leave Atlantic Canadian waters for their southern habitats.

Some sharks also stay in the Mahone Bay area for months, giving researchers a chance to study both migrating sharks and those that return to the region again and again.

This research has become more important as the white shark population in the Northwest Atlantic has bounced back.

Hussey said the population went through a major decline in the past due to overexploitation, but conservation efforts, growing seal populations, and warmer ocean temperatures have all played a part in bringing more white sharks to Atlantic Canada.

With more sharks, there is also a greater need for reliable information.

Researchers currently detect about 70 to 80 individual tagged white sharks on receivers in Mahone Bay in an average year. Hussey thinks the total number of sharks passing through the region could eventually be between 2,000 and 3,000 animals.

That makes it even more important to know where and when sharks are present, both for conservation and for public safety.

The station’s research is centered on spatial management, finding out which habitats and areas white sharks prefer to use. This information could help guide conservation actions and make sure key habitats are protected from human impact.

It could also help lower the chances of conflicts between sharks and people.

White sharks are naturally attracted to coastal waters, which are the same places where people swim, surf, dive, and enjoy other activities. Hussey pointed out that humans are not the shark’s usual prey, but encounters can sometimes lead to mistakes, especially in murky water.

Smoky Sausage & Tomato Stew

Serves 4-6

A frugal, cozy supper for the last days of summer.

INGREDIENTS

- 1 tbsp oil
- 1 onion, diced
- 3 cloves garlic, minced
- 250-300 g smoked sausage sliced
- 2 cups diced fresh tomatoes
- 1 medium zucchini, diced
- 1 cup corn kernels
- 1 can white beans or chickpeas, drained
- 1 tsp smoked paprika
- ½ tsp dried thyme
- ½ tsp chili flakes (optional)
- 2 cups broth
- Salt & pepper
- Fresh basil or parsley for serving

PREPARATION

1. Heat oil in a pot over medium. Add onion and cook until soft.
2. Stir in garlic, smoked paprika, thyme, and chili flakes; cook 30 seconds.
3. Add sliced sausage and let it brown lightly for 3-4 minutes.
4. Add tomatoes, zucchini, corn, beans, broth, salt, and pepper.
5. Simmer 20-25 minutes until thickened and flavourful.
6. Taste and adjust seasoning.
7. Serve with crusty bread, rice, or over mashed potatoes.
8. Top with fresh herbs.

Shelburne RCMP Detachment charges two men with drug trafficking

September 2 – Shelburne - Shelburne RCMP Detachment has charged two men with drug-related offences after a traffic stop in Reids Hill.

On Aug. 30, at approximately 9:30 p.m., officers conducted a traffic stop on a Chevrolet Equinox travelling along Hwy. 3 as part of an ongoing drug trafficking investigation.

Officers safely arrested the two occupants of the vehicle and seized quantities of cocaine, scales, cell-phones and cash.

Arthur Douglas Thomas, 68, of Barrington, and Jahquan Stuart Dow-

ney-Thomas, 23, of Mississauga, Ontario, are each charged with Possession for the Purpose of Trafficking (cocaine) and Possession of Property Obtained by Crime.

The men appeared in Yarmouth Provincial Court on Aug. 31.

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The field station’s data is meant to contribute directly to management work by the Department of Fisheries and Oceans. The research is carried out under a Species at Risk Act permit, with the station’s findings intended to help shape a future management plan for the species.

As white sharks become a more noticeable part of Atlantic Canada’s marine environment, the station is also involved in a broader effort to raise public awareness about their seasonal presence.

For Hussey, though, the project is about more than just studying sharks. It’s about building a place where researchers, students, fishermen, and the wider community can share knowledge and gain a deeper understanding of the waters around them.

By putting scientific research right in the middle of a coastal fishing community, the Tancook Gardens Marine Field Station hopes to create not only a clearer picture of Atlantic Canada’s white sharks, but also stronger ties between the people studying the ocean and those whose lives depend on it.

As of Friday, residents and businesses in the Town of Lunenburg are required to restrict their water use to essential purposes only. These include drinking, cooking, and sanitation.

Reservoir levels will continue to be monitored, including through Friday evening and into Saturday, to see how the system is responding to conservation measures and the partially restored pumping capacity.

The water shortage has also affected some community services.

Bluenose Academy was closed Sept. 3 and 4 after a request from the Town of Lunenburg due to the ongoing situation at the Dares Lake dam.

A statement posted to Facebook explained that the South Shore Regional Centre for Education was keeping an eye on the situation and staying in contact with the town. The closure happened on what was supposed to be the first day of school, and the Academy noted the disappointment for students and staff who had been eager to return. Such closures and water consumption restrictions have also been applied to restaurants in a town that relies heavily on tourism and foot traffic.

Fisherman’s Memorial Hospital had also moved some appointments because of the water shortage, but the hospital is still open.

Deans said the town is hopeful that a disruption to municipal water ser-

vice will not be necessary.

As of Friday at noon, the water utility’s treatment plant had still been able to produce potable water, so the breach has not compromised the plant’s ability to treat water for the community.

However, the municipality is also preparing for the possibility that further measures might be needed if water levels worsen.

Firefighting operations have already been adjusted as a precaution. Local fire services have shifted to rural firefighting operations, with water tankers and mutual aid resources ready to be used if needed.

The town is also working with the Regional Emergency Management Organization (REMO) on contingency planning.

For now, the municipality’s main priority is to keep enough water in the system to support essential community needs. These include drinking water, sanitation, firefighting, health-care services, emergency response, and other important public infrastructure.

The Town’s conservation directive is meant to help preserve that capacity while crews continue repairs and assessments at Dares Lake.

“Should additional measures be required,” Deans said, they will be put in place to support customers.

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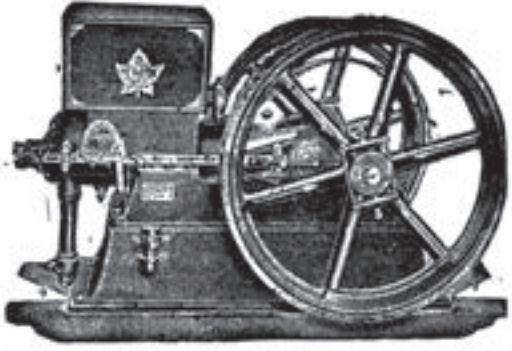

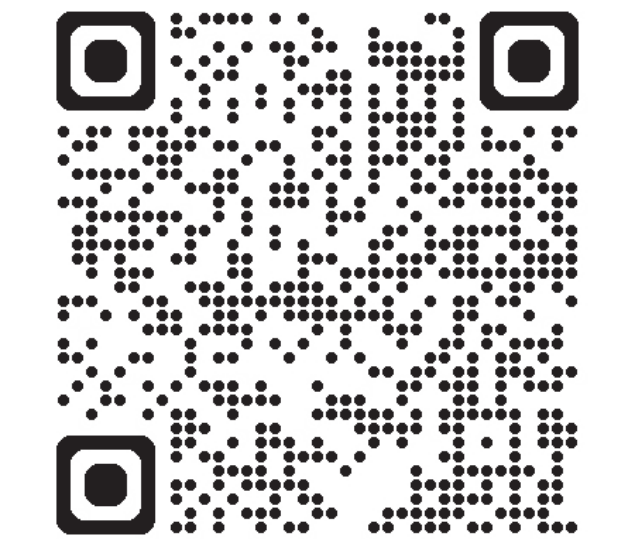

Bluenose II docking party in Clark’s Harbour

CLARK’S HARBOUR – Bluenose II, originally a fishing schooner and now a Nova Scotia icon, sailed into West Head, on Cape Sable Island, taking part in the Town of Clark’s Harbour Wharf Party Celebration Sept. 2.

Sunny skies and a light ocean breeze was the perfect weather for the event. The setting of a working wharf filled with fishing vessels, alongside Nova Scotia’s sailing ambassador provided a picturesque scene.

The pier was bustling with a busy market set up on one side, and the famous vessel tied to the other. Artisans featured their wares of paintings, pottery, jewellery, wooden crafts and whirligigs.

Vendors featured unique T-shirts and baseball hats. For the food lover, there was fresh produce, hot dogs, popcorn, cotton candy, freshly squeezed lemon aid, sweet treats and designer cookies.

Fish Safe NS hosted a survival suit competition. The person able to get into a survival suit in the fastest time was declared the winner.

There were two divisions; professional and amateur. Professionals included fishermen and other sailors, while amateurs were people off the street who had never donned a suit before. Fisherman Shamus Atwood

won the professional category with an amazing time of 17 seconds, while Dallas Fudge was victorious in the amateur category.

The calibre of busking musicians, along with a magician, kept the crowd entertained throughout the day. Sea shanties as well as big ballads and other favourites could be heard the length of the wharf. Facepainting and balloon creatures added to the party atmosphere for the children.

In addition to the seafood takeout at the wharf, several food trucks were on hand to feed guests. Options included tacos, churros, dipping dots, shaved ice, gourmet apples and fish and chips.

Nova Scotia Sailing Ambassador’s Mobile Exhibit, a walk-on museum, was situated at the head of the wharf. Panels and displays chronicled the history from the time of racing and winning the International Fishermen’s Cup to the rebuilding of a legacy. Standing behind a replica of the ship’s helm brought you a step closer to actually being onboard.

Open decks on the Bluenose II provided an opportunity for visitors to walk the decks free of charge, chat with the crew and pose for pictures on board the ship. Approximately 1,000 people walked the gangplank and boarded the vessel.

Founded in 1868, BFDBand is recognized as one of Canada’s oldest continuing bands and Canada’s only volunteer fire-service-sponsored band. An independent, tax-exempt registered charity and qualified donee in Nova Scotia, the band gratefully acknowledges the Town of Bridgewater and the Bridgewater Fire Department as its major sponsors since 1952.

“BFDBand has always been more than music,” said Frances Davies,

executive secretary. “Our members serve as community and cultural ambassadors, sharing music at concerts, ceremonies, parades, heritage events, and collaborative performances across Nova Scotia and beyond.”

BFDBand regularly provides ceremonial support for the Bridgewater Fire Department. It also presents public concerts at the Bridgewater and Chester bandstands and performs in churches and community venues throughout Bridgewater, Lunenburg, and surrounding communities. Upcoming collaborative concerts include an Oct. 25 performance in Bridgewater with the volunteer band from RCAF 14 Wing Greenwood. On Dec. 12, BFDBand will host the concert band of the Second Chances Community Music Society from Halifax, an organization that also supports a string orchestra, multiple choirs, and beginner ensembles.

Past ambassadorial collaborations have included the Royal Canadian Navy’s Stadacona Band, the RCMP Musical Ride, Men of the Deep, singer-songwriter Terry Kelly, and multiple visits by the Band of the West Yorkshire Fire and Rescue Service from the United Kingdom.

The West Yorkshire Fire and Rescue Service Band has invited BFDBand to perform in the United Kingdom in August 2027, continuing a long-standing musical friendship. A portion of the funds raised through the campaign will support this international exchange, while strengthening the band’s broader community mission and long-term sustainability.

Past travel and ceremonial appearances by BFDBand members have included performances at the Menin Gate in Belgium; in York and Bradford, United Kingdom; at the Canadian Fallen Firefighters Foundation ceremony in Ottawa; at Nova Scotia Lieutenant Governor’s Garden Parties in Halifax; at the Parrsboro Music Festival; and at the relaunch of Bluenose II in Lunenburg.

Musicians who play any instrument are invited to inquire about joining BFDBand through the full band or the specialized ensembles now being assembled.

“BFDBand offers people a chance to share the joy of music while carrying forward a nearly 160-year legacy of community service,” Davies said. “We welcome musicians, supporters, donors, sponsors, and volunteers who want to help tune up our communities and beyond.”

Former Jerry’s Diner location to become Bridgewater’s fifth Tim Hortons location

BRIDGEWATER - Since the early ‘90s, Jerry’s Diner has been a staple in Bridgewater.

Many residents of the town have memories of going to the diner on a semi-regular basis, or went when they had to go to the hospital and wanted to get breakfast after their early morning visits.

Sadly, since the end of May, the restaurant has been closed, ending over 30 years of service in the town, re-opening as Bon Appétit in late June.

However, on Aug. 24, Bon Appétit and the building came to an end as well, as it was knocked down to make way for new construction.

According to the town of Bridgewater, permits have been issued for the new structure.

“Permits have been issued for the construction of a new main structure for a convenience store, restaurant and drive-through, in conjunction with a gas station use. A subsequent building permit has been issued for a restaurant interior fit-up to accommodate a new Tim Hortons location,” said a town representative in an email to the South Shore Bulletin.

Jennie King’s parents, Jerry and Vera Twain first owned and operated the convenience store and gas station. They owned the convenience store for almost 40 years and operated Jerry’s Diner since the early ‘90s.

“I was probably three or four when they actually started as the Finest Kind convenience store. That was the original name. My Uncle Danny actually built the store. Just a little convenience store. At that time there was nothing on that side of the street; I think maybe the hospital had just opened a few years before, and they were starting to build the Glen Allen subdivision,” said King, who added that she grew up hanging out or working around the store.

“I always joke and tell people I was a convenience store kid. My brothers and I practically grew up on that corner. Whether it was us out in the woods, playing in the back or helping to bag ice or scoop ice cream or fill up the cooler, it was a real family affair,” said King.

Jennie also worked in the diner when she was in school. She was working at the diner on Sept. 2, 1998, the day Swissair Flight 111 crashed into the Atlantic Ocean off the coast, killing all 229 people on board.

“The morning that Swissair had gone down and I had the experience of seeing fishermen coming in and reliving it; some of them were the first on site,” said King.

Eventually, her parents sold the establishment, and Jerry’s Diner’s name was later changed to Bon Appetit.

“My family actually had originally sold it to Wilson’s Gas. My mom was diagnosed with cancer. So they sold the establishment then, and then they went off to do some bucket-list things before my mom passed,” said King.

Wilson’s Gas was then bought out by Quebec-based Alimentation Couche-Tard.

In August 2022, Alimentation Couche-Tard obtained the consent of the Competition Bureau of Canada to acquire the Wilsons System, with the condition that they had to sell a portion of their network to another Quebec conglomerate, Harnois Énergies.

Harnois Énergies acquired 52 sites across the four Atlantic provinces, including the gas station

that was at Jerry’s Diner.
“My dad called me in the morning, when they were physically tearing down the building, and I said, ‘God, Dad, this is so sad, how do you feel about this?’ And he said, ‘You kind of can’t stand in the way of progress,’” said King.

“It is really good to see growth, you know, some rejuvenation because it is such a charming little area. I think it would have been wonderful to see the rejuvenation of a Jerry’s Diner or something that isn’t just another kind of franchise, something that brings people around the table,” said King.

Rumours about what would be built on the premises spread across Facebook. Many people also shared their memories of Jerry’s Diner and how it left a lasting impact on the community.

“It was so heartwarming when I saw the post of when they first started kind of circulating and, you know, everybody telling them memories; it was just really special,” said King.

Sailing forward: LAYAG unveils a new identity for the Filipino Community of the South Shore

The association’s new logo reflects both ancient Filipino heritage and the experience of today’s Filipino Canadian community.

At the heart of the design is the Balangay, a traditional wooden boat used by early Filipino seafarers. It represents the journeys of Filipino ancestors while also reflecting modern migration and the experience of building a new home across the ocean.

The logo also incorporates Baybayin, an ancestral Filipino writing system, spelling out “Layag” and connecting the organization to the Philippines’ precolonial cultural heritage.

Ocean inspired typography completes the design, representing the Maritime connection shared by the Philippine archipelago and Nova Scotia.

The new LAYAG identity and branding were developed through the creative work of Aries Naron, director of public engagement and media strategy, in collaboration with the association’s leadership. His work helped bring together the cultural meaning, his



tory, and vision behind LAYAG’s new identity.
For president and founder, Camla St. Croix, the new identity represents more than a visual change.

“LAYAG reflects who we are, where we came from, and where we are going as a community. We want Filipinos and Filipino Canadians on the South Shore to feel proud of their heritage while also feeling deeply connected to the communities we now call home.”

The refreshed identity also comes as the association strengthens its leadership. Recent additions, along with Naron, is Rachelle Ortiz Alimagno was appointed director of performing arts.

Retired couple breathes new life into Lunenburg bowling alley

“Is your bowling alley for sale?” I sent this message to Pajo’s in the spring of 2024, and it’s been a whirlwind ever since.

My husband Gus and I wanted to move permanently to Nova Scotia. Why Nova Scotia? Gus had seen a photo in a magazine in the 1980s framing a beautiful town. Without knowing where it was, he declared he was going to live there one day. It was Lunenburg.

We bought a house near Lunenburg in 2018, and we decided to retire here. Let me tell you, immigrating ain’t easy. Our limited options included starting a business or buying an existing business.

Lunenburg is beautiful but tiny, with tourism driving many businesses. When we saw the listing for the bowling alley, things clicked: here was a business that directly supported local residents as well as visitors – a place where our contributions would directly help the local community.

Gus was formerly the principal software engineer at a drone company in Switzerland and I was formerly the CFO of the North Carolina Housing Finance Agency. It was nuts for us to buy a bowling alley, but I knew I didn’t want to go back into finance.

Never wanted to wear a suit, never wanted to attend another meeting, never wanted to sit at a desk. Our collective work experience would be helpful, but the fact that Pajo’s had knowledgeable and seasoned staff made us feel comfortable enough to take the plunge into an area we knew nothing about.

When we first checked out the bowling alley, Gus noticed that the balls and pins were “different.” We didn’t even know about the existence of candlepin bowling. It’s the most challenging type of bowling, played primarily in the Maritime provinces and the New England states. With the smallest ball and the largest pins of any form of bowling, no-one has ever scored a 300 game – but they’ve had

a lot of fun trying.

Here’s the real kicker: candlepin machinery hasn’t been manufactured since the late 1950s/early 1960s. Let that sink in. Creativity, a bit of MacGyver, a lot of advice from other candlepin mechanics and a few Hail Mary’s are required to keep these machines afloat.

There’s a private Candlepin Mechanics Forum group on Facebook where we have met a lot of supportive people. Art, the owner back when it was Bowlarama, came down to visit and offered some great advice for the alley, much of which we implemented. Nadine and Jacob Robar at Bowl More Lanes in Bridgewater reached out to us early on to offer their support, which meant the world to us. It’s all for the shared love of the game.

The building at 79 Victoria Road in Lunenburg has a long history. Built in the early ’60s, it started as Blue-nose Lanes. The name was changed to Bowlarama in the ’90s under new ownership, then to Pajo’s in 2011 when it was purchased by Jody Lantz and Patrick Ring. “Pa” for Patrick; “Jo” for Jody. Clever, eh?

Although there were different owners and names, it was very much a family affair. Jody’s dad, Bob Lantz, worked at the bowling alley since the mid-to-late ’60s. Jody started working at the bowling alley in 1992. Jody’s mother Dot, his late wife Heather, his daughter Grace, his brother Clyde, his sister-in-law Anna, and his niece Katie have all worked there.

Jody was hoping that somebody would buy Pajo’s to continue the bowling business, but nobody was interested in keeping it as a bowling alley. We are forever grateful Jody held out until he could sell it to us.

After more than six decades as a bowling alley, 79 Victoria Road has a slew of stories to tell. More than a few people met their significant other at the bowling alley. Rumour has it that some bowlers were actually conceived in the parking lot.

Pajo’s has a few plaques of a beloved bowler, George Winters, who died many years ago. We were told that somebody tried taking these down years ago and had bad luck because George’s ghost was upset.

No worries – the photo and plaques are up, and George is hopefully happy. In the early morning hours each day, people circle through the Tim Horton’s drive thru for a coffee, then sit in their cars under the trees in the Pajo’s parking lot to catch up with each other. Even our parking lot is a welcoming space for making memories.

Now that we’ve spent a year here, we know what locals do in the summer: they get out of dodge when the tourists roll in. What do locals do in the winter? They come to Pajo’s—to bowl, to catch up on things, to take a load off.

With most businesses being seasonal, there are not a lot of places to go in the winter, but Pajo’s is always one of them. With renovations

wrapped up, we will stay open in the summers, bringing the joy of candlepin bowling to tourists and visitors as well as locals. Those from away can go back home to tell their friends how much they enjoyed it, helping to keep candlepin alive and well.

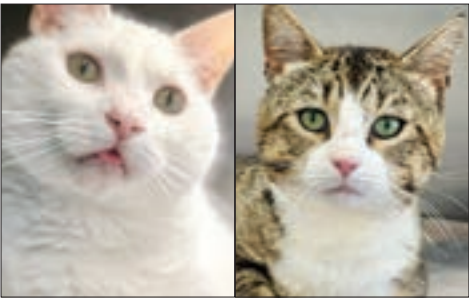
Both Clefford and Myles are FIV or FeLV-positive, meaning they require homes that can accommodate their

The deliberate and the impulsive

Impulsive action or deliberate action? If you're looking for a standard to guide your life, which do you think will lead to more effective results?

Impulsive actions can be appealing. The very word "spontaneous" sounds like fun, doesn't it? Unexpected surprises, laughter, delights of all kinds can accompany impulsive actions. We don't know what will happen, but it could be awesome!

Then there's deliberate action. We think things through, examine options, weigh pros and cons. Then we make a conscious choice. Doesn't sound as much fun, does it? It also doesn't give us much wiggle room if it doesn't work out. After all, we did it deliberately. We're responsible. Sigh.

If we decide to apply some fundamentals of Choice Theory to our lives, then we would lean toward deliberate actions. That is, although we might consider our feelings when we make a choice, we would definitely include some thinking.

We might begin our general decision-making progress by examining what we want; let's call it a goal. Then, think about what we're doing toward achieving that goal. How's that working? Good? Carry on with more of the same. Poorly? Perhaps a change is in order. Can't say for sure? Gather more information or continue till the situation becomes clearer.

That's a pretty deliberate process, wouldn't you say?

Here's a question: Have you ever set out to deliberately hurt someone? Whether physically or emotionally, have you ever deliberately decided to cause hurt?

Now, I don't want any confessions. Please don't send me stories of any terrible hurts you may have caused. Nope, this question is only for you to consider for yourself.

People can be cruel to each other. And while we can be hurtful to strangers, it's possible to be even more cruel to the people closest to us. We know them best. We know what would really hurt them, don't we? And when things aren't going our way, it can be tempting to lash out with a word or deed that we know will really sting when it lands.

But if we want good relationships, that's about the worst possible thing we could do, isn't it?

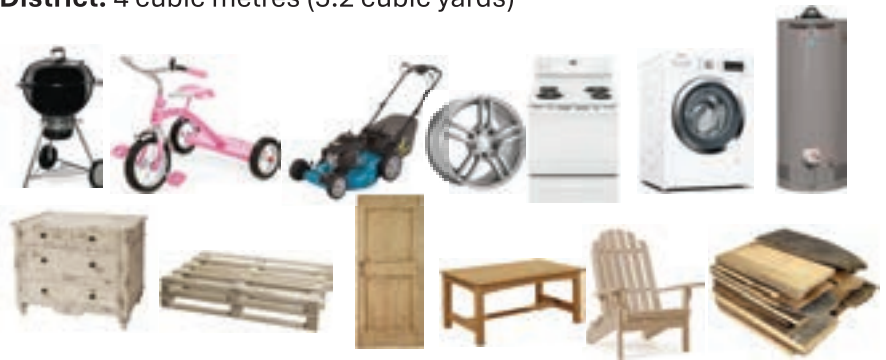

Some good birding lately

On Aug. 29 I joined a small group of people for an outing at Indian Falls. I did not have much hope for seeing many migrants, but the birding was not bad.

We had 13 species of birds with one red-eyed vireo, two blue jays, nine black-capped chickadees, two golden-crowned kinglets, one white-breasted nuthatch, three red-breasted nuthatches, a brown creeper, one veery, one American goldfinch, four dark-eyed juncos, one black and white warbler, one northern parula, one northern yellow warbler and one black-throated green warbler.

Some of the group followed me to Walden where we picked up red-tailed hawk and several cedar waxwings, six palm warblers and an alder flycatcher. A purple finch was found along the Woodstock Road as well as a hermit thrush and American Robins.

Later in the day I birded Petite Riviere where I got word that Wilma Clancy had found a red knot at Crescent Beach (Lunenburg County).

I went to Crescent Beach (Lunenburg County), where I had again 13

species of birds. For shorebirds I saw 50 black-bellied plovers, 138 semi-palmated plovers, 27 short-billed dowitchers, one lesser yellowlegs, one willet, two greater yellowlegs, five red knots, 30 least sandpipers and 16 semi-palmated sandpipers.

While birding at Crescent Beach (Lunenburg County), I saw Wilma Clancy and she told me about seeing 43 lesser yellowlegs at Broad Cove, so off to Broad Cove did I go. I saw 16 species of birds there with the lesser yellowlegs count going from 44 to 80, while I was there. I've only seen more of that species at one time in the past at Oxner's Beach. Other shorebirds that I saw at Broad Cove were one willet, six semi-palmated plovers, eight ruddy turnstones, and seven semi-palmated sandpipers. For warblers I saw one common yellowthroat, one northern yellow warbler and four yellow-rumped warblers.

On the way home I stopped in Dublin Shore for 18 semi-palmated plovers, 10 least sandpipers and 13 semi-palmated sandpipers. For the day I saw 47 species.

On Aug. 30 I saw only 26 species. In the morning I birded to Bridgewater

and back home. I was laying down for a rest when I got the call that a German birder named Gerd Rotzel had found a Wilson's Phalarope at Beach Meadows Beach.

I therefore went to pick Dorothy Poole up at Port Medway and off we went to search for the bird. There was no sign of it once we arrived. I spoke with Ethan Sarty who was the one who phoned me and he told me six beach goers had walked right through where the bird was on the flats inside the beach and scared it off.

Ethan suggested that we look from the main road across the way. We were successful in seeing the Wilson's

phalarope. Unfortunately, others arrived just a minute or two too late as a merlin came through and scared the shorebirds off. Dorothy and I did see 16 species at the beach.

For other shorebirds we had two black-bellied plovers, 55 semi-palmated plovers, 19 short-billed dowitchers, three lesser yellowlegs, three greater yellowlegs, 30 least sandpipers, and 21 semi-palmated sandpipers. Four palm warblers hanging around the boardwalk was a nice bonus to see.

Jason Dain saw two red-necked phalaropes at the beach. The Wilson's phalarope was again seen by Logan Moore on Sept. 1.

On Aug. 27 Miguel Morales reported lots of palm warblers and northern parulas moving through at Broad Cove. He also told me that he had seen several Hudsonian whimbrels at Crescent Beach. Kevin Lantz sighted a red knot at Hell's Point in Kingsburg.

The American avocet as of Aug. 31 was still present at Rose Bay. On Aug. 29 Mark Dennis found an American golden plover at Drinking Brook Park on Cape Sable Island. Natalie Barkhouse-bishop located a stilt sandpiper at the guzzle on Cape Sable Island.

When it's time to go, how you go still matters

There's a moment a lot of us know. The drive home when you finally admit you're done. The resignation letter sitting in a drawer or just sitting in your head waiting for the nerve. The quiet, private decision that it's time to leave the job.

We don't talk about that moment much and we talk even less about what comes after it: how to actually leave.

Let me put the most important part first, because everything else depends on it. Your health and your life come first. If a job is costing you your well-being, your peace, or your evenings with the people you love, then leaving isn't giving up, it's taking care of the one responsibility that outlasts every position you'll ever hold.

Yourself.

Nobody should stay somewhere that's quietly wearing them down out of guilt, or fear, or a vague sense that they owe it.

So, the hard question was never whether to go. It's how.

Because here's the knot I keep turning over; when we leave, it lands on more than us. Depending on your role, it can land hard. A co-worker inherits the work you used to carry. A manager scrambles to cover the gap. An owner looks at the schedule and sees a hole where you used to be. Your decision is about your life. It's also a harder week for someone who counted on you.

I've watched people let that guilt

twist the whole decision. They stay too long, leave too messily, or agonize until the choice makes them sick. So let me offer the reframe that might help: guilt is not a good reason to stay. But it is a very good reason to leave well.

You are not responsible for the outcome. You are responsible for your conduct. Those are not the same thing, and we blur them constantly.

You can't control whether the news is taken gracefully or personally. You can't guarantee the team won't wobble, or that whoever replaces you will do the job the way you did. That isn't yours to carry and if you try to carry it, you'll never really leave. You'll just linger in the doorway, worn out and resentful.

What is yours is smaller, and entirely within reach: the notice you give. The things only you know, written down instead of walked out the door in your head. The problems you name honestly instead of leaving someone to discover them at the worst possible time. The handoff you make on purpose. Leaving well isn't about staying longer. It's about closing the loop cleanly.

And there's one more thing, how you leave is the last chapter of your reputation and it's the chapter people remember. A smooth exit fades quietly. A bad one gets retold for years. In a community where everyone eventually knows everyone, the way you walk out of one place becomes either a quiet recommendation or a quiet warning at the next.

I've worked for people who made me want to run for the nearest exit, leaders who didn't seem to care about the people under them at all and even then, the standard doesn't change. You don't lower yourself to the leadership you're leaving. You leave as the leader you wish you'd had.

That, in the end, is what this comes down to. Leaving well is just leadership turned toward yourself. It's asking a simple question on the way out: when this is over, who do I want to

have been? Not for their sake. For yours. because you're the one who carries your name into whatever comes next.

You're allowed to go. You also get to decide who you are as you do it. Make it a door people would gladly welcome you back through.

bird, American goldfinch and purple finch. There were quite a few warblers that I could not get an ID for as they moved past too quickly.

Migrants found in Halifax County were buff-breasted sandpipers, Baird's sandpipers, a Wilson's phalarope, Hudsonian godwits, a dickcissel, a prairie warbler, an eastern kingbird, and yellow-breasted chats.

The northwest Mainland had a Caspian tern. Southwest Nova Scotia including Digby and Yarmouth Counties had a red-shouldered hawk, Baird's sandpipers, stilt sandpipers, a Canada warbler, a Tennessee warbler, a golden-winged warbler, a prairie warbler, a mourning warbler, a Baltimore oriole, lots of south polar skuas, a parasitic jaeger, a pomarine jaeger, 700 plus Atlantic puffins, a laughing gull, a black-legged kittiwake, at least seven great egrets, an American bittern and 18 eastern kingbirds at one location. Good finds in the Valley were blue-gray gnatcatcher, Philadelphia vireo, American golden plovers, 30 killdeer in one field and a red knot.
