Councillor Ben Brooks resigns, says he no longer believes change is possible within current municipal system

MODL – Municipality of the District of Lunenburg Councillor Ben Brooks has resigned from council, saying he no longer believes he can effectively represent residents within what he calls a “fundamentally broken” municipal system.

Brooks, who represented District 9, announced his resignation after serving nearly two years on council. MODL Deputy Mayor Chasidy Veinotte will look after the District 9 residents until a special election is held.

In an interview, through messenger, Brooks said his decision did not come from any single event or disagreement but from his growing belief that meaningful change

could not happen within the current structure of municipal government.

Brooks said he first ran for office because he thought local government could enact more grassroots impact.

“I ran because I believed local government could be more responsive to the people and communities it is supposed to serve,” he said.

He said he also wanted to make sure the voices of District 9 residents, businesses, and community groups were better represented at the council table, arguing that rural communities are too often expected to adjust to decisions made elsewhere.

Brooks says his perspective has shifted.

“I left because, after nearly two years, I had come to believe that I could no longer re-

main true to the people who elected me while continuing to participate in a system that I believe is fundamentally broken,” he said.

According to Brooks, many residents overestimate how much authority municipalities actually have. He argued that much of a municipality's work involves carrying out provincial requirements, applying for grant funding, and implementing policies developed outside the local level.

While he acknowledged those structural limits, Brooks said he became increasingly troubled by what he saw as a lack of willingness to push for greater municipal autonomy or to rethink how local government is organized across the region.

RCMP details how emergency alert decisions are made following Chelsea incident

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SOUTH SHORE - Questions have emerged after an officer-involved shooting in Chelsea, N.S., that led to an emergency alert warning residents about an armed suspect. Many are asking why some people never received the notification and why similar incidents do not always result in public alerts.

The situation began when RCMP officers responded to a report involving an armed man in the Chelsea area. As police searched for the suspect, an Alert Ready emergency notification was sent out, warning residents of the potential danger and advising them to

stay alert.

In the hours that followed, though, some Nova Scotians said they never received the alert even though they live nearby. Others wondered why emergency notifications seem to be used in some high-risk incidents but not in others.

The Nova Scotia RCMP says the decision to issue an emergency alert depends on an ongoing assessment of public risk rather than the type of incident itself.

“Every day, we respond to reports of crime and requests for service across the province,” said Allison Gerrard, senior communications advisor with the Nova Scotia RCMP.

“At each call, our officers collect in-

formation, gather credible details and assess the situation.”

Gerrard explained that emergency alerts are used only when investigators determine there is an immediate danger to the public.

“If at any time an investigation leads us to believe there’s an imminent risk to the public, we issue a civil emergency alert through the Alert Ready system,” she said.

That assessment can shift quickly as officers gather more details.

“Many incidents, especially those involving alerting situations, are fluid,” Gerrard said. “Risk assessments during an incident are ongoing. As more information is received or circumstances change, an alert can be issued, updated or cancelled.”

During the Chelsea incident, RCMP officers stayed in the area while searching for the suspect and evaluating whether the public remained at risk.

“RCMP resources were deployed throughout the Chelsea area for several hours as officers worked to locate the suspect and assess any ongoing risk,” Gerrard said. “As the investigation progressed and information was gathered, it was determined that there was no longer an immediate threat to public safety when the alert

was ended. Officers maintained a presence in Chelsea while investigative efforts continued.”

The comments show that emergency alerts are not automatically triggered by every police case involving weapons or dangerous suspects. Instead, the decision depends on whether police believe the public faces an immediate and ongoing threat that warrants urgent action.

The Alert Ready system is meant to deliver urgent public safety notifications through compatible cell-phones, television and radio. However, receiving an alert is not always certain. Factors such as a device’s settings, wireless connection, software compatibility or location at the time an alert is issued can affect whether a notification is received.

He stressed that his resignation was not aimed at any individual or specific council meeting.

Instead, he described it as the result of his experiences, saying he reached a point where staying in office would have meant accepting another two years on council despite no longer believing real reform was possible from within.

“Once I understood that, I believed the honest thing was to leave,” he said.

Brooks thanked supporters for their trust but said he believed staying in office after losing confidence in his ability to serve the district would have been more misleading than resigning.

He added that stepping away from council does not mean stepping away from public advocacy.

He plans to continue speaking out for greater local authority, stronger economic development, fairer regulations, and more government accountability, adding that he believes he will now be able to do so more freely.

Brooks hopes his resignation sparks a wider discussion about how municipal

government operates across the South Shore.

He questioned whether maintaining multiple municipal administrations remains the best model for communities whose economies, infrastructure, and growth are closely linked. Brooks said conversations about regional consolidation, greater local control over tax revenues, and more flexibility to develop local solutions should become a priority.

He also expressed concern about declining voter turnout in municipal elections.

“When most eligible residents do not vote, that is not simply apathy,” Brooks said. “It can also be a sign that people no longer believe the institution has a meaningful influence on their lives.”

On the MODL Facebook page, Mayor Elspeth McLean-Wile thanked Brooks for his service on behalf of council, saying public office requires significant dedication and commitment.

“While we are sorry to see him leave council, we respect his decision and wish him all the best in the future,” she said in a statement.

Two men charged after shots fired at Nineveh home, RCMP allege

LUNENBURG - Two men are facing firearms-related charges after RCMP say shots were fired at a residence in Nineveh earlier this month.

Lunenburg District RCMP responded to a report of gunfire at a home on Highway 208 around 11:50 p.m. on July 12. Police said several shots were fired into the residence, though no one inside was hurt.

While responding to the call, officers spotted a vehicle believed to be linked to the shooting. They carried out a traffic stop before reaching the scene, arresting two men and seizing a rifle.

Orland James Barrett, 68, of Hubble, has been charged with eight offences related to the July 12 incident. These include uttering threats to cause death, possession of a weapon for a dangerous purpose, using a firearm in the commission of an offence, intentionally discharging a firearm while being reckless, along with several firearms possession offences.

During the investigation, RCMP

also found that Barrett was allegedly involved in a similar shooting at the same home on June 28.

For that earlier incident, he faces six more charges, including intentionally discharging a firearm while being reckless, possession of a weapon for a dangerous purpose, unauthorized possession of a firearm, possession of a firearm knowing its possession was unauthorized, unauthorized possession of a firearm in a motor vehicle, and possession of a weapon obtained through the commission of an offence.

Barrett was released on conditions and is set to appear in Bridgewater Provincial Court on Aug. 19.

A second accused, a 57-year-old Halifax man, will face similar firearms-related charges tied to the July 12 incident. He was also released on conditions and is scheduled to appear in court on Sept. 9.

The investigation is being led by the Lunenburg District RCMP General Investigation Section with help from RCMP Forensic Identification Services. Police say the investigation is still ongoing.

‘I don’t want to hear excuses’: Councillors upset with delays on water fixes

LIVERPOOL – Simmering frustration with ongoing water woes in Liverpool boiled over at Region of Queens council last week.

Councillors say they want a clear plan to fix old water mains sooner than later. District 3 Coun. Courtney Wentzell has consistently raised the issue of aging infrastructure on the west side of Liverpool.

“It’s starting to be very frustrating to not just me, but to the residents,” Wentzell said at the July 14 council meeting.

“And when I have to look at my residents’ face and come up with excuses, I’m not going to anymore. We’ve doubled their water utility bill. ... We’ve got faulty meters, we’ve got issues with people that their meters are 30 to 40 years old.

We’ve had constant reports that we lose 60 per cent, or better, of treated water. ... And we’re carrying on, putting water up over that hill (to Mount Pleasant).

“You can’t drive water up and expect to have enough volume to create pressure while your old infrastructure is constantly breaking and not being repaired. I don’t want to sit in this council anymore and hear excuses.”

The municipality is undergoing a \$28-million expansion and upgrade of its water and sewer system, with \$10.7 million in provincial funding. The work will extend services to the Mount Pleasant area of Liverpool to accommodate two planned major housing developments which could add up to 1,200 people to the area and to the municipal water system.

Wentzell is concerned that doubling the utility’s customers will only accentuate issues caused by leaky pipes and old water meters. And he said he was confused why outside contractor Dexter Construction could get so much done in the past four months on adding new infrastructure, when some parts of town are still waiting to have pipes replaced.

In January, council supported Wentzell’s call for a comprehensive review of the timeline to replace the existing transmission main. Adam Grant, the municipality’s director of infrastructure, has said that the region is still waiting for approval from the Nova Scotia Regulatory and Appeals Board to go ahead with those fixes.

In a Dec. 22 decision, the provincial regulator granted the region’s

Canada’s last Grand Banks Schooner is dying. Will we let her?

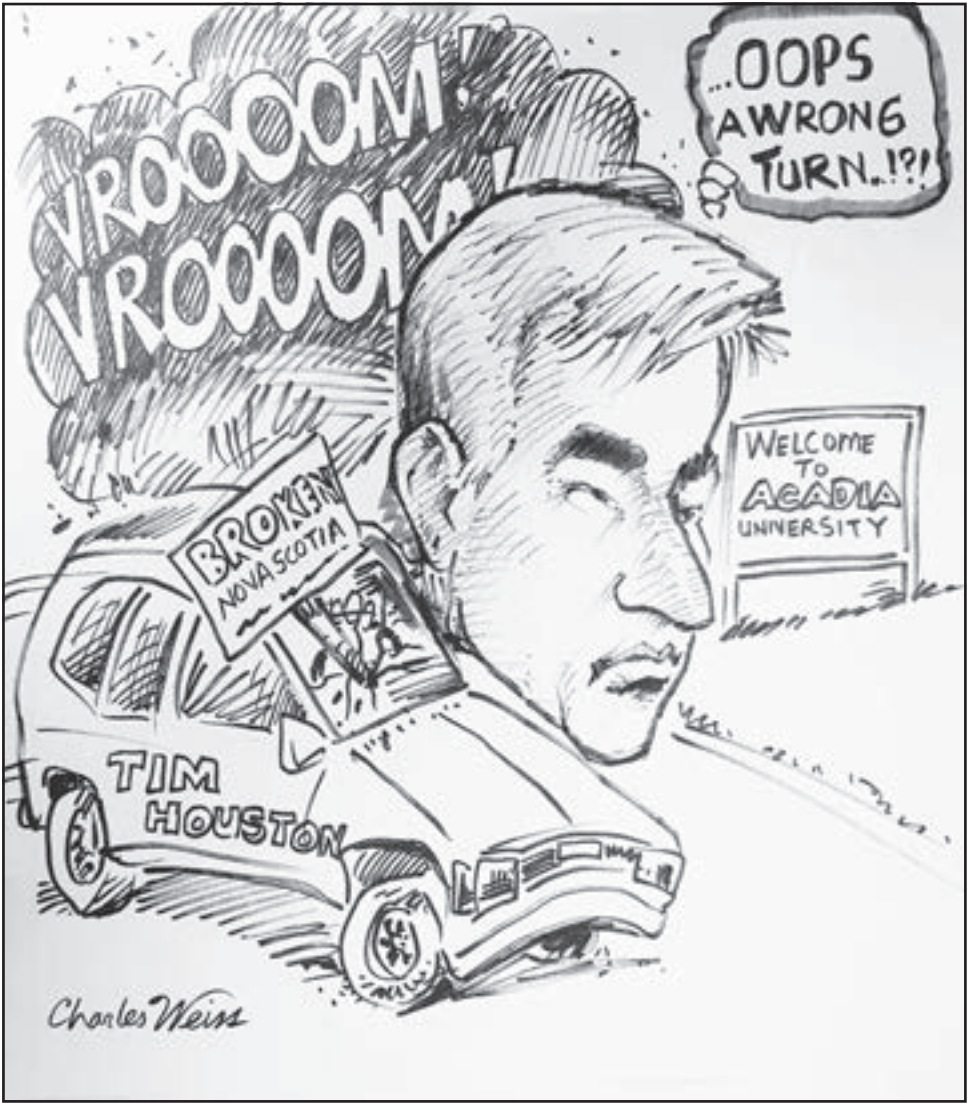
She is 143 feet of Nova Scotia history. The schooner Theresa E. Connor, built in 1938, the last original Grand Banks salt cod dory fishing schooner in Canada, is hauled out of Lunenburg Harbour right now, sitting on land, waiting. The question that should keep every Maritimer awake is: waiting for what?

Lunenburg has always been more than its beautiful houses. Yes, the 18th- and 19th-century homes climbing the hill above the harbour are worth celebrating, and rightly so. But the heritage that truly made this town, that made this region, was forged at sea. It was built by the men and women who invested, designed, cut the timber for, crewed, serviced, packed the fish and welcomed home vessels exactly like the Theresa E. Connor. The pretty houses came later. The ships came first.

In 1967, looking at Canada’s 100th Birthday, Lunenburgers saw what was coming. One by one, the old schooners were slipping away, sold off to the Caribbean trade, or simply left to rot. Citizens passed the hat, went door to door, raised the money, and gave the Theresa E. Connor to their community as a Centennial gift. She became the founding exhibit of the Fisheries Museum of the Atlantic. For years, her docents were the fishermen themselves, blue-water men who had worked the banks, who could tell you what it smelled like and what it cost. That was living heritage.

She was once on the Canadian hundred-dollar bill. Now she is on the dock deteriorating, and the clock is running out.

There is only one of her left. Not one of a few — one, period. Ships like



the Theresa E. Connor once crowded harbours from New Brunswick to Newfoundland. They are gone. When this vessel goes, so does the last physical, tangible connection to the fishery that built Atlantic Canada. There will be no second chance, no course correction, no future restoration project. Once she is landfill, she stays landfill.

The objections are predictable. The money is tight. Times are uncertain. These things are true. But they have always been true of every worthwhile preservation effort. Great bags of funding do not simply materialize, they are assembled, piece by piece, through will and ingenuity. In New England, there are several comparable historic fishing schooners, fully restored and even sailing today. We have one left, and we are hesitating.

When a beloved church burns, a community rebuilds, not because the money is sitting in a drawer waiting to be spent, but because the community decides it matters. The Theresa E. Connor is our cathedral of the sea. The restoration she needs, historic detailing as well as a hull rebuild stem to stern, is achievable without the

regulatory complexity of a passenger vessel. It can be done deliberately, transparently, as a living educational project for Canadians and visitors alike. The craftsmanship required can be documented, shared, and taught. The vessel herself becomes the curriculum.

This is not, at its heart, a question of money. It is a question of will. Do we, as Maritimers and as Canadians, believe that how we got here still matters? Do we think the generation growing up now deserves to stand on the deck of the ship that built this coast, not a replica, not a photograph, but the real thing?

The Lunenburg of 1967 answered that question with door-to-door fundraising and a museum. The Lunenburg of 2026 has the benefit of living in a UNESCO World Heritage town that draws tens of thousands of visitors from around the world, in no small part because of the authenticity this vessel represents. The argument for saving her is, if anything, stronger now than it ever was.

Where there is the will, there is a way. The only question left is whether we have that will.

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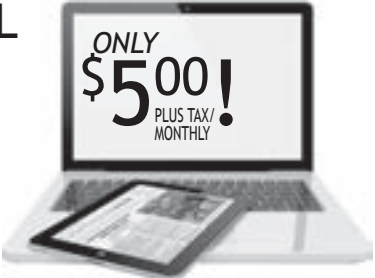

New rules sorting out garbage issues

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LABELLE – Region of Queens Mayor Scott Christian says people are adapting to new garbage sorting rules, despite recent community concerns of increased illegal dumping.

“I’m pleased with the fact that we do have a better co-ordinated, better resourced approach,” Christian said in an interview. “Myself and (the local councillor) have received a huge amount of positive feedback.”

Christian was responding to comments made recently on a July 13 Facebook post from a cottage owner in Labelle showing large piles of bagged trash, blue bags and other items at the local grey box garbage collection site, after a weekend. It resurrected fears that people from other areas were illegally dumping their waste to get around new sorting rules.

People who live on private roads in Queens County do not get roadside collection. That includes the heavily developed cottage country around Molega, Ponhook and Annis lakes.

So, they have to take their refuse to a central location, known as grey box sites, usually located off a main road. Those contain large grey bins for people to leave their garbage, recyclables and green cart waste.

The region has struggled over the years to clean up those sites after complaints from residents about illegal dumping, inconsistent collection and lack of maintenance and enforcement.

In March, the municipality signed a new five-year, \$6.5-million garbage collection contract with GE Environmental that included services improvements at those sites. The new deal increases collection

frequency, requires regular inspection and proof of work reports at each visit.

The same company is also collecting recyclables under a new provincially mandated blue bag program that requires homeowners to sort more plastic, paper and styrofoam waste and drop off certain items at a central depot.

The region has also followed other municipalities in requiring garbage in clear bags, with one opaque bag, while limiting the overall number to six bags.

“I think that those grey box collection sites are better now than they’ve been since I’ve been aware of this issue,” Christian said.

“So I’m really pleased that we’ve actually finally made a dent in that, and that there’s actually better service being received.”

Residents, however, have complained that the new sorting rules are confusing and time-consuming. And they’re concerned that because of that, people will dump their garbage illegally at grey box sites or in other areas.

Christian said high volume sites like Labelle have increased regular weekly collection on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays. He said it makes sense that the sites would be more full after a weekend, as people leave their cottages and drop off their waste.

He said he worries residents are getting the wrong idea from photos posted to social media.

“It’s frustrating when residents take to Facebook to capture a shocking picture that’s completely unavoidable, from my perspective, that’s going to happen on the Sunday. It’s promptly cleaned up on the Monday,” said Christian.

“Frankly, I hear a whole lot more positive on that file than the negative, and that was never the case in the past.”

Municipality seeks public input on proposed final draft of new land use planning documents

LUNENBERG - Residents of the Municipality of the District of Lunenburg will have two opportunities later this month to learn more about (and comment on) the municipality’s proposed new land use planning documents before council makes any final decisions.

The municipality is inviting the public to review the proposed final draft of its new Municipal Planning Strategy (MPS) and Municipal-Wide Land Use By-law (LUB). The two documents will guide how land may be developed and used across the municipality for many years to come.

The latest draft comes after years of work through the Municipal-Wide Land Use Planning Project, which has included several rounds of public consultation, technical reviews, and discussions with council, the Planning Advisory Committee and community stakeholders.

The municipal council completed the first reading of the proposed replacement Municipal Planning Strategy and Municipal-Wide Land Use By-law at its July 14 meeting.

Council also passed motions giving notice of its intention to repeal the municipality’s current planning documents, including Municipal Planning Strategy By-law 035 and Municipal-Wide Land Use By-law 049, along with all amendments, and replace them with the updated versions.

According to the municipality, the proposed documents represent the fourth draft prepared during the planning process and include feedback gathered throughout the project.

During council’s review of the latest draft, discussion centered on several proposed changes,

such as updated regulations related to agricultural land uses and revised definitions concerning recreational vehicles.

Municipal officials are encouraging residents to review the proposed documents before council considers adopting them. Planning staff notes that public feedback remains important to the process and could help shape the final versions of the planning strategy and land use by-law.

The first opportunity for residents to learn more was held July 21 at the municipal office.

The session will give residents a chance to ask questions directly to planning staff and discuss how the changes might affect their property or neighbourhood. Staff will also be available to explain specific policies and respond to questions about the proposed planning framework.

Council will hold a formal public hearing Wednesday, July 29, beginning at 6 p.m., also at council chambers in the municipal office.

Unlike the information session, the public hearing will allow residents to make formal submissions directly to council regarding the proposed Municipal Planning Strategy and Municipal-Wide Land Use By-law before any final decision is made.

Municipal planning strategies set out a community’s long-term vision for growth and development, while land use by-laws define the rules governing how land can be used, including zoning, permitted uses, and development requirements.

Residents interested in participating are encouraged to review the proposed final draft documents and attend either, or both events.

application to hike water charges for the municipal utility’s 1,200 customers by about 100 per cent to deal with long-term debt.

Other councillors supported Wentzell’s call for more water clarity.

“My biggest concern about this is that we’ve been told so many times different things,” said District 6 Coun. Stewart Jenkins.

“And every time we’re told something, I’ve looked back and seen the cost increases because of these delays. Cost increases that this county can’t afford....We need to get the public’s trust back in what we’re saying, and get (the work) done in a timely manner, and no more of these delays.”

Mayor Scott Christian said he shares Wentzell’s frustration and said he wants to assure residents that council is committed to using municipal employees and expertise whenever possible to get work done.

“The intent of this council is to have better cost certainty, better control over timelines, timely execution of capital projects and deliberate and strategic deployment of our internal resources and making use of subcontracted resources when it makes sense,” he said.

“This organization has not done a good enough job of that in the past. We need to get better at that.”

Councillors voted unanimously to ask staff to return with a report on the region’s plan for replacing outdated water meters and when exactly the upgrades to the water main and existing laterals will get done.

Wentzell said he’s tired of waiting and he just wants the work to get done.

“I’m just totally, totally frustrated,” he said. “I got a thick skin. I can take the heat for the votes that we’ve taken here, and I can support all my fellow councillors in decisions we’re making. But I can’t support this anymore.”

Three aging municipal buildings slated for demolition as Lunenburg County awards millions in contracts

LUNENBURG - Three aging municipal buildings in Lunenburg County are one step closer to coming down after the Municipality of the District of Lunenburg approved several contracts worth millions for a multi-site demolition project.

At its July 14 meeting, council authorized staff to award tender 2026-05-002 to Asbestos Abatement Ltd. for an estimated total cost of \$2,095,011.47, including contingency and net HST. The project will involve the demolition of the former Centre School, two buildings at the MARC and the former Department of Natural Resources depot at Wiles Lake.

Municipal staff said each building has reached the end of its useful life and that removing them will improve public safety while also opening the door for future re-development.

The former Centre School has faced growing vandalism and deterioration in recent years which is creating ongoing maintenance and security issues for municipal staff.

At the MARC site, the old program and administration buildings need to be removed to make room for the municipality's new Parks and Recreation building and accessible playground.

Meanwhile, the former DNR depot at Wiles Lake has decayed to the point where it is no longer

suitable for future use. A separate concept plan is already being developed to guide redevelopment of that property.

According to the staff report, grouping all three demolitions into a single tender was meant to lower costs by taking advantage of economies of scale.

The tender, issued June 11 and closed June 30, drew four qualified bids. Asbestos Abatement Ltd. submitted the lowest bid at \$2.09 million, followed by IQ Environmental Inc. at \$2.23 million and Dexter Construction Company Limited at \$2.35 million. A fourth proposal from Gerhardt Property

Improvements came in much higher at more than \$8.1 million. Municipal staff noted that the winning bid fits within the capital budget approved for the three projects.

The municipality says the demolition project supports council's strategic priority of upgrading and managing municipal infrastructure.

Staff also pointed out that removing the vacant structures will cut down on vandalism and prepare the properties for future community use.

Canada's First Lady of Country Music returns home

PORT MEDWAY – Carroll Baker is returning to her hometown and bringing a few of her friends with her for “An All Girl Affair” pair of concerts July 24 and 25 at the Carroll Baker’s Musical Mem’ries Centre.

The concerts, scheduled for 3 – 5:30 p.m. each day will feature, of course, Baker, along with Dolly Dunn, Jolee Patkai, Kim Tuplin, Joyce Seamone and her daughter, Candace will be joining in.

The Friday concert is already sold out and at last count, there were just a few left for Saturday’s event. Advance tickets are \$25 each and they are also available at the door for \$30.

To purchase your tickets, you can contact Baker’s niece, Rhonda at 902-874-2240 or by e-mail at tfocbs@gmail.com.

“I love it. When we do that show, we’re going to have a great time and everyone that is going to be there will have fun,” said Baker.

This year marks the fourth anniversary of Baker purchasing the centre – the church that Baker remembers singing in and attending Sunday School in.

Prior to the purchase, the congregation decided that numbers were so low that they could not afford to keep it going. It was put up for sale.

“When it was put to me that the church would either be torn down or made into a bar – that was the reason we bought it,” she said. “We wanted to keep the church as it was.”

It was decided that a Friends of the Carroll Baker Society (FCBS) would be formed to fundraise, find volunteers and keep up the church, that contains many of the Carroll’s music memorabilia, but still can be used for church activities, such as weddings, funerals, baptisms and the like.

The church has remained open over most of the summer to welcome tourists and this year the FCBS has secured funding to hire a student, like in previous years, to maintain hours for guests to take a look.

However, Baker said “we have a building that needs help.” Despite ongoing efforts by the FCBS, more funds need to be raised to keep the centre going. Currently, the roof is needed to be replaced and although a friend has stepped up to oversee the project, more work needs to be done.

That is why Baker came up with the idea for the show and it is also the reason for the....

THE DRESS-DRAW

Baker had another thought... “I have all these costumes that I don’t wear anymore and I probably couldn’t even get over my head now. I thought, what are they for, maybe they could help.”

So, the raffle idea was born. She said this dress was purchased and worn for the Big Country Awards, (now the Canadian Country Music awards), which Baker hosted with Ronnie Prophet. She said the dress



is in supreme condition, “like the day that I bought it.”

Tickets are just \$30 and only 350 will be sold. If the raffle is sold out, the winner will be announced during the concert Saturday. If not, tickets will be sold until the draw scheduled for July 30.

“Each ticket is only \$30 and if you win, you are getting a dress worth \$5,000. That’s a good deal.”

First prize is the dress and an autographed photo. Second prize is three CDs and an autographed photo and third, is a Carroll Baker Mem’ries hat, T-shirt and autographed photo.

Prizes will be shipped at no cost to the winners.

To get your tickets you can contact Rhonda through the methods as listed prior.

Baker wanted to make sure that people know that all money raised will go to the centre and gave thanks to her friends that will be performing at the concert at no charge.

THE NEW VENTURE

Jolee Patkai grew up in Prince County, P.E.I. to a musical, farming family. She met Carroll Baker when she was just 14 at a concert and little did they know, their paths would cross and a beautiful friendship would be formed.

The two have sang together for the past several years and in their most recent adventure, Carroll was the producer on record for this, her third album, called This Is It.

Eight of the songs were penned by Carroll Baker and two others were written by Bryan Way.

The first song, I’m in Love with the Radio, was released April 13 to radio stations and online across Canada.



It is now sitting at number 10 on the Canadian Indie Country Countdown (as of July 12).

This was her third CD, having completed her first, Shore Rhapsody, in 2006 and Going Home in 2012. All except two songs were her own.

“I met Carroll when I was 14, originally. Then more recently my husband and I went to a concert of hers and then we connected through Facebook. She liked the way I sang, so she invited me to do a couple of shows with her in Summerside,” she said, describing how things got started.

From there, Patkai toured with Baker on her Christmas on the River Run tour in Ontario and during a visit at the Baker home, Patkai said Baker began popping “all these cassettes in and I’m going, I’ve never heard that one before, or I like that...how come you...”

Baker said that some of them were released, some of them were just demos...then she said, “you know I think you have a voice that could probably do justice to some of these.”

Patkai responded – “I don’t know Carroll.”

Then just a couple of years ago, Carroll and her partner/manager, John were in P.E.I. and they stayed with Patkai and her husband... “we sat on our deck and started popping these CDS in again. And so, out of all of them, we got it down to 10 songs.”

From there, it was back and forth between P.E.I. and Kitchener to record.

“She really mentored me, taught me how to put more feeling into it and would tell me, ‘it sounded pretty, but you can do better.’ John was also there to encourage that way as well,” she said.

“I was like, I can always do better – cry when it’s sad, smile when it’s

happy. It makes a big difference. She taught me so much.”

After working on those 10 songs, her and Baker were in touch with Joe Wood and Lauren Tutty in Liverpool, friends of Carroll’s who were to help get the music on the radio and track each single as it gets played.

“Working with Carroll has been amazing and she and John are wonderful people and the studio we worked with, Blue Gull Studios in Kitchener, there were lots of beautiful musicians came in, but I didn’t actually get to meet them, but we were all in at different times doing the different tracks.

“It’s a building, learning experience, but you know at the end of the day, we’re happy with what we have. This could be just the beginning. And what can I say, if Carroll Baker asks me to record some of her songs, what am I going to do. It’s like if you have faith in me, I will do it.”

A BIT MORE BACKGROUND

As mentioned, Jolee’s mom was a huge influence on the music side. Erma, as a young lady, was in a country band, the Ed Matthew’s band.

“They played all over and she dragged me and my sister all over the place – for concerts, competition and that kind of thing She even had us dancing on stage in little outfits, doing polka and stuff.”

Music was put on the backburner as she grew up, got married and had three sons. After they were older, she started writing and playing a bit with country bands and duos, solos and various types of genres and groups.

“I’m just a good old country girl, dairy farmer who married a tobacco farmer. I weed, milked cows and birthed calves and all that stuff – pickin’ and grinnin’ but I am more of a rhythm girl though.

Patkai described the songs on the album as quite different with some new country, bluegrass and more.

Baker called a few friends from Liverpool who could help Jolee in getting her name and music out there.

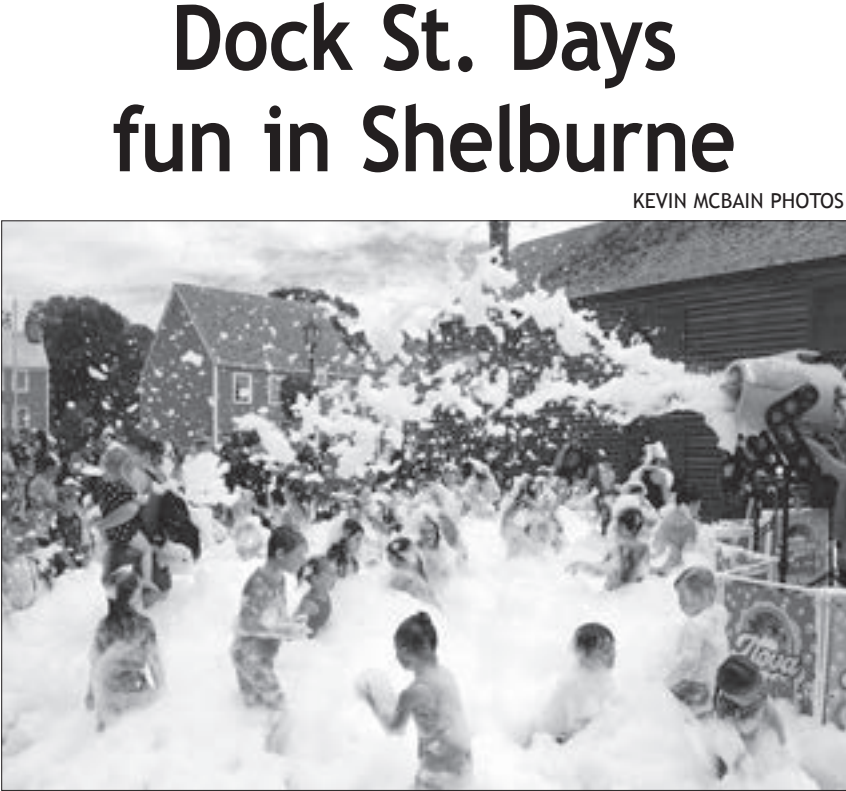
One of them was Country Music Hall of Famer, Joe Wood.

“I think the key for Jolee is to have Carroll there. I mean, Carroll can’t get radio to play the song because she is Carroll, but what Carroll can do for Jolee is to give her confidence, answer questions and be there for her.

“This is a real stressful and very aggressive business, so it was a treat to deal with both of them. Carroll’s a pro and she can just point her in the right direction from the studio to the details of getting the songs out to the radio, what it’s going to look like and what we’re going to say in the bio. It’s like having Ali in your corner during a boxing match.”

Wood was inducted into the Canadian Country Music Hall of Fame earlier this year. Alongside his wife, he founded RDR Music Group, pioneering digital radio delivery and helping deliver over 10,000 songs for independent artists.

Woods’ role in Jolee’s project is working with Lauren Tutty, another contact from Liverpool.

“They will give me the songs to listen to and get my opinion as to what I think will work for the radio. Then I will put together a package to send to radio stations across the country. I put it on a platform, make sure everything looks graphically appealing and make sure all the content that is needed, is there,” he said.

He then delivers the package to the radio stations, then hands the duties over to Tutty to do her job as a radio tracker.

“Basically, I work on behalf of the artist and contact radio stations and try to get the music directors to listen, hopefully download and add the song to their playlist,” she said.

“I guess I have been doing it for almost 20 years now and I’ve worked with a lot of Canadian artists and I have been happily successful with a lot of new artists.”

She has helped Jess Moskaluke, the Recklaws and Tenille Townes to name a few. He has also worked with Gord Bamford to get some of his singles out in radio land.

Tutty said the times have changed. He used to set up many radio tours for artists, to give them a chance to meet the artist, interview them and get to know them. Now, stations mainly follow the charts, which is tough for young singers, such as Patkai.

“This is basically her introduction to Canadian country radio. They have no idea who she is and they have nothing to compare to. It’s tough.”

She says that she basically tracks the songs and how they are doing on the charts. If a song is doing well, the single may stay out there for eight to as long as 22 weeks, such was the case of a Gord Bamford song, before releasing the next single from the artist.

She said things have changed a lot over they years. Back several years ago, you would have to have a completed album, before taking it to the stations. Now you don’t have to even have an album/CD. A lot of artists just have singles.

Back 30 years ago, radio trackers and artists, you would have to have a completed album. You would send them to the stations, then ask them to listen to your vinyl record or CD.

Now, all stations have a cloud-based platform known as a Digital Media Distribution System (DMDS). Artists can upload their audio, video and promotional assets and it helps to give real-time tracking so the sender know exactly when a broadcaster downloads or plays their content.

Tutty said that Carroll and her team are still learning, but that they were great to work with and although it is only early on in her career, she thought

that Patkai’s music is performing on par with other brand-new artists on the radio scene.

CARROLL, THE PRODUCER

Patkai’s recording was the first official work that Baker is taking credit for. As a singer, she was very active in the production of all her recordings, but this is the first official one for her.

“I hope Jolee’s happy with it. She’s such a happy person and they are such wonderful people. I am glad she is getting this chance,” she said.

She remembers talking to Patkai about doing a recording and at that time she was doing Loretta Lynn and Dolly Parton songs, but she encouraged her that she should do an album with just her voice, not anyone else’s.

“I thought it may be a stretch in this day and age, because the kind of music that both she and I love is real traditional country music. The country music that if you sit and listen to it and it’s happy, it makes you happy and it’s sad, it makes you sad. It’s not about everyone sounding the same, as they do today. I wanted it to be a traditional as it possibly could and I couldn’t have found a better person to do that.”

Baker said that getting things ready to produce took a long time, estimating that she spent probably 800 hours looking for songs that would be a good fit for Patkai.

“That’s a long time and a big job to find the right songs for the right singer. But it’s probably the most important part, because that’s where the marriage begins.”

Baker said that she sent a lot of songs to Patkai to try, but didn’t make her aware that many of them were Baker’s songs. In the end, eight were songs that Baker wrote or co-wrote. The final two were songs that Baker and her siblings grew up singing and were embedded in her history.

“So, I sent her those two songs and she fell in love with them.”

Her single that is now out, I’m in Love with the Radio, Baker changed the wording from She’s in Love with the Radio, to make it more personal, after listening to Patkai in the recording session.

“I was hearing it differently back then. It just worked. It sounds much better and her version is way better than mine.”

Overall, Baker said that she is really happy with the album and says that there may be at least six or seven Top 10 hits included.

“If radio gives her a chance. It’s hard to get on radio today. They don’t seem to want anything different, anything new. That’s why when you hear the girls sing, they have the same kind of delivery, the men as well. Back in my day, none of us sounded the same. We all had our own voices and we wrote

our songs and they were all different.”

Baker said that she wished that radio stations could have some of the freedoms they had back in the day to do request lines and have local artist spotlights, but that is not the case in many communities.

She said this is where Joe and Lauren came into the picture.

FAMILY AFFAIR

Many of the folks behind the music have connections to Baker such as her daughter who performs background vocals.

Several of the musicians are also well known to Baker and Patkai as well.

“It just came together. We all know each other,” said Baker. “I hope that Jolee is happy. I don’t think she’s the kind of girl that would complain if she wasn’t. Although she may get a funny look on her face, because she does that to me sometimes.”

Bridgewater reports progress on Housing Accelerator Fund commitments, with all action plan initiatives completed

BRIDGEWATER - The Town of Bridgewater says it has completed all the initiatives outlined in its Housing Accelerator Fund (HAF) action plan. The confirmation marks a significant milestone in its agreement with the federal government to increase housing supply and improve affordability.

Council received the update at their most recent meeting where staff described the town's progress under the program.

Bridgewater entered into an agreement with the Canada Mortgage and Housing Corporation (CMHC) in December 2024, making the municipality eligible to receive more than \$3.3 million through the federal Housing Accelerator Fund. The funding supports municipalities that take steps to speed up housing development by modernizing planning processes and introducing new housing initiatives.

The agreement included five initiatives that began in January 2025 and were scheduled for completion by the end of 2027. According to the update presented to council, all of those initiatives have now been completed.

One of the commitments under the action plan was to create affordable housing incentives for available municipal land in a goal to encourage the construction of more affordable homes in the community.

Funding through the Housing Accelerator Fund is linked to the completion of specific milestones, which makes the implementation of the action plan a requirement for the town to continue receiving federal support.

Bridgewater also committed to permitting the construction of 347 new housing units by December 2027 as part of its agreement with CMHC.

The latest figures presented to council show the town is making steady progress toward that goal.

As of June, permits have been issued for 214 new housing units, representing more than 60 per cent of the municipality's overall commitment. Of those units, 10 have been identified as affordable housing.

Town staff said they expect to approve an additional 113 units, which would bring Bridgewater much closer to meeting its overall housing commitment before the end of the program.

The update highlights the town's ongoing efforts to respond to rising housing demand as Bridgewater's population grows. Like many municipalities across Canada, the town has faced continued pressure to expand the supply of both market and affordable housing in recent years.

When the Housing Accelerator Fund agreement was announced, municipal officials said the funding would help remove barriers to residential development while supporting long-term growth. The program hopes to encourage municipalities to streamline approval processes and adopt policies that make it easier and faster to build new homes.

As part of those modernization efforts, Bridgewater is also preparing to launch an electronic permitting system. Staff told council that e-permitting will be introduced soon, allowing builders and developers to submit permit applications digitally.

The new system is expected to improve efficiency by simplifying the application process and reducing administrative delays to support one of the Housing Accelerator Fund's main objectives of accelerating housing approvals.

The municipality will continue working toward its target of 347 permitted units by the end of 2027 while expanding tools designed to support future residential development.

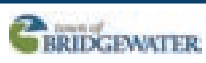

Applications open for Liverpool co-op housing development

LIVERPOOL – Applications are now being accepted for a much-anticipated affordable housing co-operative in Liverpool.

The 30-unit complex under construction by Queens Neighbourhood Co-operative Housing began accepting rental inquiries on July 13.

The development, dubbed the Trestle Way Neighbourhood Project, sits on a 2.6-acre property on Lawrence Street, bounded by Amherst Street, Queens Street Extension and the Trestle Trail.

Three fully accessible buildings contain one-bedroom, two-bedroom and three-bedroom apartments. About 70 per cent occupancy is set aside for seniors, but available to anybody who meets the application criteria.

Rents are based on income. QNCH says the maximum charged will be \$790 a month for a one-bedroom, \$1,040 for a two-bedroom and \$1,105 for a three-bedroom.

In December 2025, the federal government announced \$6.96 million in low-interest loans through CMHC’s Co-operative Housing Development Program toward the project. The Nova Scotia government has chipped in \$4.95 million through the Department

of Growth and Development. And the Region of Queens sold the land to the co-op for \$1 and committed \$203,000 for project management and architectural fees.

It also received almost \$1 million in funding from other sources.

Trestle Way has been in the works for more than four years. Queens County desperately needs affordable housing. The 2021 census showed that 35 per cent of the region’s renters spend more than 30 per cent of their income on housing.

Construction is expected to be finished by November, with the first residents scheduled to move in by January 2027.

Swallow nesting success

Bird Notes

On July 10 Steven Shewchuk sent me an email saying that he had a good breeding season for tree swallows with good nesting success.

Nests in Rose Bay, Bayport and Mason’s Beach had fledged young during the week. I saw a nest box at Oxner’s Beach during that week that still had adults feeding young in the nest box. For those not familiar with Steven he had put out about 50 new nest boxes and he plans to put out 50 more for the next nesting season.

He is surprised by a lack of warblers this year. I have noticed a lack of warblers, at almost everywhere I’ve traveled to this year, in respects to other years. I’ve spoken to birders across the province who also see a similar trend this year.

Hopefully, it is just an off year and not something that will continue.

A lot of it could have to do with habitat change and growth, making normal breeders select other locations with habitat more agreeable with breeding requirements. Steven has had red crossbills and cedar waxwings.

In regard to habitat change, I can give an example of what I’m referring to. I always get Lincoln’s sparrows and

mourning warblers at Folly Mountain. It has been about two or three years since I’ve last visited there. I went there this year and could not find either species. The habitat had grown up so much since I was there last and thus changed the ecosystem enough that the two species likely are no longer breeding there.

Back in July I received an email from Heather Tunnah and Peter Churchill in Laconia. They had their first sighting of a cedar waxwing in their yard for the first time. It made up for the failure of wood ducks to return to their pond and nesting boxes.

Hooded mergansers also did not return to breed. A pair of killdeer did return and raised chicks and there were two successful hatches of barn swallows in their barn and tree swallows in a hollow of a maple tree. Their neighbour, Nola Button saw a woodcock and her chicks on the Laconia road.

On July 14 Shirley Gordon of LaHave watched as two eagles came together over a fish. She watched them plummet downwards and they only parted ways at the last second before going into the river. The outcome, as to the fish, which caused the whole incident is unknown.

I get many reports every year of birds other than the ruby-throated hummingbird coming to the hummingbird feeder. Many different species of birds will come to the hummingbird feeder after sugar.

The yellow-bellied sapsucker pecks many holes in trees for sugar and similarly a lot of birds go to the holes to get sugar the same as to the hummingbird feeder. I also get many reports of the hummingbirds disappearing. When they have young they diet until the young leave the nest is strictly insects. So once the young leave the nest the hummingbirds should return to your feeders or yard.

Sandy Marshall reported a tree at the top of Brooke Street in Lunenburg that has been well worked by pileated woodpeckers. It is very impressive. My hairdresser had also pointed this tree out to me and she had photos of the pileated woodpeckers at this tree.

I have two field trips coming up. The first is for the Nova Scotia Bird Society and is on July 25 with a storm date of July 26. You do not have to be a member to attend. We will meet at 8:30 a.m. at the three churches in Mahone Bay. We then bird around Mahone Bay and then to Mader’s Cove and end at Second Peninsula.

Where these stories come from

Every week, this column lands in front of you with a story. This week, I want to pull back the curtain on where those stories come from, the answer is the whole point of why I do this.

Every article I write is real. Some are pulled from my own past. Many come from conversations I’ve had in the very week I’m writing, they’re sometimes an experience of my own, sometimes one shared with me over coffee, over the phone, or even by screenshot.

Because of the work I do and the circle of friends and colleagues I’m blessed to be part of, leadership stories find their way to me constantly. Some are spectacular, some are far less than that but every single one of them is a learning experience and a learning experience wasted is the most expensive thing in business.

Let me take you back to where it started for me. In 1985, I took my first job in the service industry as the attendant at the Cheer Wagon, a small portable kiosk on Main Street in Liverpool, supported by the business improvement district of the day.

We sold 15-cent refreshments.

There were fountain Pepsi, because we had a Pepsi plant right in the community, popsicles and those little tubs of ice cream with the flat wooden spoons, the ones that, 40 years later, still make something happen that’s somewhere between nostalgia and a shudder.

From that kiosk forward, I was fortunate. I had amazing leaders, real mentors, people who taught me what it meant to care for the people you work with.

Until the day I didn’t and that day changed everything. Up until then, I honestly believed everyone thought the way I’d been taught to think. I assumed every leader was a good leader because they had learned to be one.

I didn’t know there were leaders out there who simply didn’t care about the people working with them and for them. Discovering that was gut-wrenching.

It was also the spark that lit this business. SMillerVision wasn’t built to tell people what to do. It was built to give people access to the learning, the mistakes, and the hard-won knowledge that took me 40 years to earn, so the scars can be mine and the shortcuts can be yours.

Which brings me to this week, and why this topic chose me.

A friend spent much of the past year in a job that tested her from day one. Three hundred and sixty-five days of peaks and mostly valleys. It ended more than three months ago, with a termination delivered over the telephone, which is a column all its own, and then, this past weekend, a message arrived from the general manager of the property. Congratulations on your one-year work anniversary.

Sit with that for a second. An organization that couldn’t be bothered to end a working relationship with dignity also couldn’t be bothered to update its own systems, so its final word to a former employee was an automated celebration of a year she survived rather than enjoyed.

If you know the peak-end rule, you know people judge an entire experience by its most intense moment and how it ends. Her story followed the peak-end rule to a T and the ending was written by a database nobody was leading.

Here’s the lightbulb I want to go off as you read this: too many of us believe we already know everything we need to know to run the businesses we’re responsible for and to support the people who work in them.

That simply isn’t true. Every single day is a learning experience and

the leaders who accept that don’t just get better results, they change lives. Your leadership touches your team, your team’s families, your own family. That’s the real multiplier.

Here’s the truth that stings: every lesson you refuse to learn leaves a mark.

It just doesn’t leave it on you, it lands on the team member who dreads your Tuesday meetings, who stopped offering ideas, who’s quietly interviewing somewhere else right now.

You don’t feel the scars of your blind spots, your people wear them. I’ve spent 40 years collecting these lessons, the ones that worked and the ones that cut, and they’re yours for the taking. The only question is whether you’ll reach for them before someone on your team pays for another one.

That’s what this column is. That’s what it’s always been. And it all starts with one question I’ll keep asking as long as I have breath and ink to ask it with:

Would you want to work for you?

If this one hit home, if you’ve got a story that deserves to become a lesson, I’d love to hear it. That’s how these columns get written, after all.

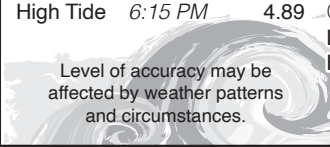

New portrait gallery opens in Mahone Bay with focus on Canadian artists

MAHONE BAY - A new gallery devoted entirely to portraiture has opened in Mahone Bay. The Mahone Bay Portrait House gives visitors free access to a collection that covers more than a century of Canadian art.

Located at 572 Main St., this latest addition to the town is a privately owned gallery showing more than 100 works by Canadian artists from across the country. The collection, gathered over the past decade by a Nova Scotian through inheritance, auctions, and commercial galleries, sits inside a 19th-century home built by local shipwright Titus Langille.

The gallery brings together works by both historical and contemporary artists. It places special focus

on portraiture's role in recording people, culture, and Canadian history. Featured artists include Alex Colville, Miller Gore Brittain, David Blackwood, William Kurelek, Kim Dorland, Arthur Lismer, Allen Sapp, Joyce Wieland, and Ozias Leduc.

One of the collection's main attractions is a group of works by Robert Harris, the Prince Edward Island artist best known for his 1884 portrait Fathers of Confederation. The gallery includes a full-scale preparatory drawing of the painting, which was lost in the 1916 fire that destroyed the Centre Block of Parliament.

The reproduction anchors a room focused on Canadian political history, where it appears beside newly created sculptures of key figures involved in Confederation.

The gallery also draws attention to Robert Harris' ties to Mahone Bay. His brother, Ned Harris, served as Anglican rector in the community for four decades at St. James Anglican Church, one of Mahone Bay's well-known waterfront churches. Another brother, architect William Critchlow Harris, designed the church itself.

Among the works on view is a double portrait of Ned Harris and his wife, Florence Zwicker, the daughter of Mahone Bay's former harbour master and customs collector. The painting shows a view of the town's harbour as it looked around 1890.

Along with its permanent collection, the Mahone Portrait House plans to hold rotating exhibitions. Its first temporary show features figurative works by two Atlantic Canadian artists connected to the Nova Scotia College of Art and Design: the late Brian Burke and Jane Reagh of Corner Brook, N.L. Many of the pieces on display are available for purchase.

Portraits throughout the gallery portray a wide range of Canadian figures, including everyone from civil rights pioneer Viola Desmond and hockey player Sidney Crosby to Sioux Chief Jumping Bear and former prime minister Pierre Trudeau.

Rather than centering one artistic movement or period, the collection looks at portraiture through many styles and techniques. Oil paintings, drawings, and sculptures appear together to show how artists have represented the human figure in different ways over time.

The second field trip is for the Bay to Bay Trail. We will meet at 8 a.m. at the entrance to Long Hill. We then will bird towards Fauxburg, return to the cars and go to the Fauxburg Bay to Bay section and bird there. The date is Aug. 1 with a storm date of Aug. 2.

On July 14 Ethan Sarty located three Hudsonian whimbrels at Beach Meadows. At Hirtle's Beach four piping plover chicks hatched on July 2. At the time of writing on July 15 the young still have 13 days to go before they fledge and can fly. So I ask that you be mindful of these young birds if you visit Hirtle's Beach in the meantime.

On July 11 JD Bharvad reported two American oystercatchers, a Caspian tern, 14 semi-pamated plovers, 10 short-billed dowitchers, 30 least sandpipers, a lesser black-backed gull and both greater and lesser yellowlegs at the Big Glace Bay Bird Sanctuary.

On July 12 Claude Durand located a black-billed

cuckoo in Cheticamp. Natalie Barkhouse-Bishop sighted a solitary sandpiper at Three Fathom Harbour. Jason Dain went on a pelagic trip on Brier Island and reported huge numbers of Wilson's storm petrels, large numbers of greater shearwaters with some sooty and Manx shearwaters and a south polar skua.

On July 13 Ronnie d'Entremont saw a great egret in West Pubnico. Ian McDormand had one at Broad Branch Brook and Bertin d'Eon three at Cape St. Marie Road in Mavillette.

Mark Dennis discovered one at Cranberry Head/Goose Flats. As of July 14 a white ibis was still at Glace Bay. Logan Moore sighted two solitary sandpipers at Dryden Lake Road. Mark Dennis found a Hudsonian godwit at Daniel's Head. Colin Peddle saw a northern rough-winged swallow at the Belleisle Marsh.

On July 15 Andrew Bates saw huge numbers of sheawaters and two south polar skuas off Port George.

Young student wins national competition

WEST NORTHFIELD – Audrey Wilson’s essay on her family and their involvement in the Second World War has earned her a national title.

Wilson won first place in the national Royal Canadian Legion’s annual Remembrance Day competition which gives students from across the country the ability to enter an essay, poetry or artwork with a connection to veterans and Remembrance Day.

The competition begins at the local Legion level, with winners moving on to the district level, then on to the national level where it is judged against entries in the same age or grade level, from across Canada.

Wilson entered in the grades 5-6

age category and earned a first-place finish in the local competition – headed by the New Germany Legion branch which in this competition takes care of New Germany, Caledonia and West Northfield schools.

Her essay then advanced through to provincial judging in Halifax (Nova Scotia/Nunavut Command), then on to the national judging event in Halifax.

President of the New Germany Legion branch, Howard Gibson, says that it is a rarity to have a national winner in their midst and is very proud of her work.

Members of the Legion, including Gibson, presented Wilson with a special plaque and certificates from the Minister of Veterans Affairs and the Royal Canadian Legion national command, along with a cheque for hav-

ing the top essay. The presentation took place during the West Northfield School’s Grade 6 graduation on June 24.

Gibson said that the family did not know the content of the essay that she had written until the essay found its way back from judging in Ottawa.

“Her father knew that she had written an essay, but did not know what she wrote about it,” commented Gibson.

Wilson is the daughter of Michael and Jessica.

Gordon said that at the time the bylaw officer had approached the driver, there was no passenger in the car and the car was stationary. When Gordon went to review recording from that time, there was no video – the video turns on only when the car is started – giving proof that the car wasn’t even running.

“The driver had told me that she had indicated to the bylaw officer that the person that was being picked up was an employee, so the bylaw officer knows this, but she instead decided to say we were moving people illegally,” said Gordon.

“So from my view point, the statement from the town is slander. It’s factually inaccurate and I will be looking at what legal options we have. I will be setting up a Gofundme page to solicit funds from the community. Not sure there will be any success with that, but we don’t have the money to be able to hire a lawyer, but at this point it’s going to happen. This is harassment, selective enforcement, there’s a couple of different components there.”

Gordon said that he is not leaving the area.

He said he wants to try and operated a taxi service out and around Lunenburg, avoiding all of the standards that is needed to operate inside of the town of Lunenburg.

Gordon re-iterated that his cars are commercially insured and the drivers are licenced above what is needed.

Was this latest incident related to the incident from one month ago between Myra and Gordon?

“I don’t know that it’s directly tied, but I do believe there is some increased focus and visibility on our business and I believe that there may be some incentive from town hall to insure the taxi by-laws are better enforced,” said Gordon, adding that he has previously asked for better enforcement, but every time he has asked, the officer has just indicated they do not have the capacity to do so.

He also added that he doesn’t think that he has seen any other Facebook posts of statement about bylaw infractions on anyone – like they did with SaltWind. Gordon said he is unsure how they determined that any illegal activity was happening and what they based it on.
